

More Rooms for Girls

- HE Housing Problem in Toronto to-day presses cruelly upon the young girls on small salaries who, without homes in the city, are obliged to earn their own living. Boarding-house life, even when suitable accommodation is procurable, is not like home life. The sheltering and refining influences which a young girl should have by right are too often by necessity sacrificed when circumstances break up her home or force her to leave her home folks and come to the city.

Will You Help Us?

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union have made a success of Willard Hall as a temporary residence for young business girls while they are getting a foothold in the city. It is well equipped, well managed and so well liked by the girls that it is filled to capacity, and applicants for rooms are turned away every day for lack of space. The W.C.T.U. own the property outright, clear of debt, thanks chiefly to their own enterprise and business management. They have bought

the next lot on the west and hold clear title.

It is now planned to erect a residence. building on this site in conjunction with Willard Hall to accommodate 200 more girls than the capacity of the present building allows. The cost of this exten-sion will be \$150,000. The task of raising this sum has been assumed by the members of Toronto District, and they now appeal to the public-spirited people to help in this much-needed work.
