The preacher at last evening's service in St. David's church was Rev. R. E. Vitch, general secretary of the Canadian Bible Society. The sermon was both practical and earnest; the speaker talking for his text: 'There Any Word from the Lord?' his subject being the work now being carried on by the society in the Northwest.

Ripe tomatoes are now beginning to come down river. Two consignments were received last week and the other having arrived Saturday. They are offering now at 10 cents a pound or \$2 a large basket. A few odd boxes of strawberries are coming along but the season is really over. Raspberries and blueberries are now in the run. The former brought from 8 to 9 cents wholesale on Saturday and retailed from 10 to 12. The latter, at present, is lamb, a large quantity of which came down river last week; the prevailing figure being 11 cents 3/4 the carcass. There is but little change in the market price of new vegetables.

MARYSVILLE A gentleman who has travelled over the greater part of the province during the last few months, in speaking to a Times man, said: 'One of the most promising towns I have visited is Marysville. There is an evidence of progressiveness in general, and its business men were up-to-date in every line they represented. "There is, by the way," he added, "a post office in that place which, for perfect work, handiness of service and promptness, I have never seen equalled in cities of ten times the population. Its hotels are models of neatness, and there is certainly a future, and a great one, for such a town as this."

SCHOONER WAS WATER LOGGED

The S. S. Hudson, from St. John, Towed into Kittery, Me., in Bad Shape.

KITTERY, July 29.—The three-masted schooner S. S. Hudson, loaded with laths from St. John, N. B., for Philadelphia, was towed into this harbor Saturday morning in a water-logged condition by the British steamer Amethyst. The schooner will be beached here and later towed to Boston for repairs.

The Hudson had an immense cargo of laths when she left St. John and when she ran into a little rough weather she began to strain badly. Late Friday afternoon she sprang a leak and at 6 o'clock in the evening the water was pouring into her through several seams which had been opened. The schooner rolled around in the heavy sea and soon her deck cargo went by the board and in three hours she was in water-logged condition the character of her cargo, however, keeping her decks just above the water line.

For several hours Capt. J. A. Williams, the owner of the schooner, was absolutely helpless when he was sighted by Capt. Fulton of the Amethyst, 90 miles east by north Cape Ann. The schooner was bound for this port and her captain put a line aboard the helpless schooner and took her in tow.

The three-master S. S. Hudson has a gross tonnage of 42 tons. She was built at May's Landing, N. J., and sailed from Somerspoint, N. J. She is owned by her captain, J. A. Williams. She cleared the port on 19th inst., with 1,629,000 laths, shipped by Stetson and Cutler Co.
