The Toronto School of Medicine, in this new era in medical teaching, advances with quiet confidence, determined that every reasonable effort shall continue to be made for the best instruction of its pupils, believing that the result will be such as to gratify every well-wisher of the Institution. Students of Medicine are hereafter, therefore, imperatively required to exercise their best judgment for the furtherance of their individual interests by a faithful devotion to the study of the various departments of medical knowledge, and, moreover, by carefully selecting that school wherein those studies may be most successfully prosecuted.

Attention is solicited to the accompanying catalogue of former pupils of the Toronto School of Medicine, and the positions of eminence in the profession attained by large numbers of them. As a matter of curiosity it may be mentioned, that of the present teachers in the other Medical Schools of Ontario, nine were pupils of this Institution.

With much pride the Toronto School of Medicine ventures to point to the great success attained by many of its Students at the recent competitive examinations in the Faculty of Medicine of the University of Toronto; three Scholarships, four Medals, and three Starr Medals having been carried off by the Students of this School, these constituting all the Honors in the Faculty of Medicine offered for competition by the University.

During the last twelve years the University of Toronto has awarded to pupils of this School, after searching Examinations, forty-six Scholarships, and, including "Starr" Medals, eighteen gold, and thirty-two Silver Medals.

By referring to the accompanying Statute of the University, it will be seen that no medal can be awarded to any candidate unless he shall have been classed in Honors in all the Departments comprised in the examination.

The location of the School is one of the most beautiful and healthy in Toronto.

During the Session special attention will be given, as usual, to Pathology and Diagnosis.

A complete course on Surgical Anatomy will be given by Dr. Richardson. The Lectures on Descriptive Anatomy will be given conjointly by Drs. Richardson and M. H. Aikins.

Chemistry, theoretical and practical, under the able direction of Prof. CROFT, will be taught as usual in the Chemical Lecture Room and Laboratory of University College, where every facility of illustration is provided.
