Oosaku, Japan—Running 100 yards in 9.4-5 seconds at the recent Far Eastern Olympic games got Fortunato Catalan, crack Filipino sprinter, into a peck of trouble. For following his remarkable race, establishing a Far Eastern record, Prince Chichibu, second son of the emperor of Japan, bestowed a royal handshake and congratulations. Never where Fortunato goes he's besieged by Japanese who want to shake the hand that shook the hand of the Jap prince.

By shaking hands with him they feel that they are indirectly shaking the mit of the emperor himself—an honor greatly coveted. Catalan's backers predict he will lower his record at the coming Olympics.

LEONARD TRAINING HARD.

Dundee, Too, in Shift Work for Boat On Sept. 5. New York, Aug. 23—Benny Leonard, world's lightweight champion, has entered wholeheartedly into an intensive period of training for his bout against Johnny Dundee, world's featherweight champion, which is scheduled to take place at the Yankee Stadium on the night of Sept. 5. Leonard is determined to convince skeptics that he is capable of making the lightweight poundage of 135 pounds at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of the bout, according to reports from his camp. The criticism occasioned by the secret weigh-in on the afternoon of his bout against Lew Tendler has aroused Leonard, as has also circulation of reports credited to Dundee that the lightweight champion cannot make the weight and is dangerous.

The contest is expected to attract a capacity crowd to the spacious ball park. This expectation was voiced yesterday by Matchmaker Jimmy Johnston and is based on the advance application for tickets. According to Johnston the ticket reservations exceed those received for the recent Leonard-Tendler scrap.

PLAY HERE FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Saint Roses and Chatham Teams—J. C. Chesley Gives Cup.

J. C. Chesley, local agent of the Marine and Fisheries Department, has promised to donate a silver cup to be presented to the winner of the provincial championship this season. The cup is to be known as the Chesley Cup with Elmer Ingraham and the Sporting Editor of the Telegraph-Journal as trustees. Any bona fide amateur team that has won a fully registered amateur league is eligible to participate in a series for the championship.

The first match for this beautiful cup will take place this afternoon and another this evening when St. Rose's, winners of the City Amateur League, will meet Chatham's winners of the North Shore League. That well-nigh a record crowd will be on hand for today's games at St. Peter's Park is the prediction of those who have watched the growing public interest in these games. The admission will be 25 cents with 10 cents for the grandstand and all passes for the Park will be cancelled for these games.

Frank White, president of the local City League, will pitch the first ball and "Bill" Howard, a well-known local umpire will handle the game in conjunction with a Chatham umpire. 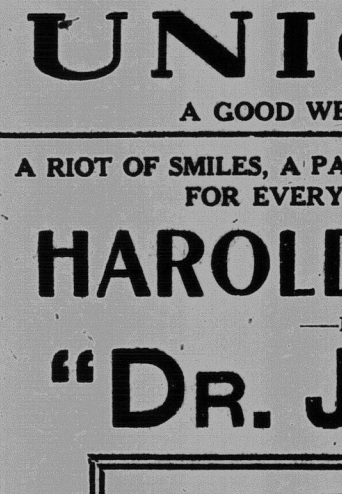
