



During the year 1921 there were 1,064 arrests by the police. More than half of these, or 597, were for drunkenness. The fines imposed in the police court and payable to the city of St. John were \$7,908.03, which with city court fees of \$906.20 gave a revenue of \$8,914.23. The fines struck under the prohibitory law and payable to the provincial treasury, totalled \$12,600.00.
