VOCATIONAL COURSE JULY 6 TO AUGUST 6

(Moncton Transcript.) As previously reported in the Transcript, the first session of the Provincial Vocational Board was held here on Wednesday.

The Hon. Fred Magee, M. P. P., presided. Others present were the Rev. Father Tester, Ph. D., C. S. C., of St. Joseph's University; Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education; Mr. Fletcher Peacock, B. A., director of Vocational Education for the Province of New Brunswick; Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, Principal of the New Brunswick Normal School; and Mr. George Maxwell, St. John, representing Labor on the Board.
