CITY WILL NOT
PAY THE CLAIM

Council Refuses to Consider Bill of Street Railway Company For Damage by Rioters—Busy Meeting of Commissioners

A fairly energetic protest by Mayor Frink against the payment of a bill for \$15,580, the amount of damage caused to machinery and plant of the St. John Railway Company in the strike riots of July 23, was the chief item in the proceedings of the common council meeting held yesterday. He described it as the most extraordinary bill ever put before them in view of the mutual agreement that had been arranged with Col. H. H. McLean for the directors of the company. The mayor had the warm support of the whole of the commissioners in his stand against the payment of the bill even though legal proceedings be threatened.

There was also an account for \$2,704 for the incidentals of the militia for two days and nights but this had been reduced to \$1,821 through the deduction of items by the recorder. This was ordered to be paid.

The commissioner of public lands recommended the renewal of the following leases, and his report was adopted:

Lots No. 470, Brooks ward, to Ezekiel McLeod for seven years from Nov. 1, 1913, at \$9.50 per lot, rental being an advance of 20 per cent; lots Nos. 537 and 538, Queens ward, to George A. Law and Jennie Jenkins for seven years from May 1, 1913, at \$9.50 per lot, rental being an advance of 20 per cent; lots Nos. 459, 460 and 461, Brooks ward, to Theodora A. Lockhart for seven years, from Nov. 1 next, at \$16 per annum, being an advance of 20 per cent.

E. Mooney, of B. Mooney & Sons, appeared before the council to complain of interruptions to their paving contract in Paradise Row. The mayor suggested that the departments each co-operate.

The commissioner of public works was given authority to maintain the barrier across the foot of Wentworth street at the exhibition grounds while the militia horses are being shipped. He was also given authority to pave Prince street near the ferry floats at a cost of \$800. The commissioner will try to keep his men employed all winter.

The council will ask the militia department to provide a gymnasium for the soldiers on Paradise Island and the request is not granted the city will undertake the task.

The Mayor reported on the progress of the harbor development in West St. John and East St. John.

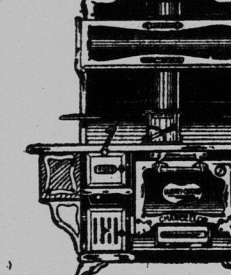
