## DRASTIC MEASURES NEEDED TO SAVE SHAD AND LOBSTERS

In answer to Chief Justice Haasen, he said that men in the Lunenburg fleet make an average of from \$100 to \$110 a month. He then explained how the men received a share of the catch. He said the men on the trawlers get paid on a commission basis. He said it is true that captains on Canadian trawlers get more money than those on American trawlers. Canadian captains, he said, are not satisfied unless they make at least \$400 a month. With reference to the food given the crews on the ships, they get the best on the market. They buy their fishing gear in the United States. Asked if he thought the American fishing owner was handicapped by being in competition with Canadian fishermen, he said he was sure they were not. He could not see why Americans could not catch fish just as cheaply as Canadian fishermen. He felt confident that the market in England for fish would continue after the war. He found the markets increasing since the outbreak of the war and this is also due to the propaganda of the government inducing people to eat more fish.

In answer to Chief Justice Haasen, he said if fish in Boston a few years ago and landed there cheaper than he could buy them at home. duction of the fish.

A-Skill, energy, character and ability are the chief factors.

Q-Is there anything else as important as these factors of experience, seamanship and energy?

A-If they have all those qualities and the grounds to go to there is no reason why they should not catch them. The Captains' Part.

Q-Then the element of character, ability to lead men and the skill of the captains enter largely into the success?

A-They certainly do.

Q-Supposing the canning industry was abolished what would be the effect on men catching lobsters in a few years?

A-It would prove a benefit to them.

Q-You would favor abolition of canning along that coast?

A-I certainly would. I believe it would be one of the most popular pieces of legislation ever enacted with the mass of people.

Q-Would you favor the passing of a law which would prohibit the catching of shad for three or four years?

A-I think a closed season would be the only thing which would save the fish.

Canada, as far as boilers are concerned, is not for Canadian vessels to change their registry to the states.

Hon. Mr. Redfield said that the United States government would not accept any boiler with the makers' stamp. He pointed out that there were inspectors stationed at the rolling mills where boiler steel was manufactured. These plates were then stamped by these inspectors. He then read sections of the law governing the manufacture of steel plates used for marine purposes. He said they have a record of every boiler and plate manufactured in the United States.

At the conclusion of the evidence Chief Justice Haasen said that he wished to thank all who kindly attended the sessions. He also expressed his appreciation for the manner in which they published the reports. He said, as elsewhere, he said, the session had been highly satisfactory.
