NEW HOTEL FOR CARLETON IS PLANNED

Report Follows Purchase of West Side Property by John F. Gleason

A West Side rumor current this week and somewhat generally credited, is to the effect that a large modern and up-to-date hotel will be an established fact in that section of the city in the not distant future.

The origin of the rumor is connected with the transfer of the Toole property (as it is called) at the corner of Union and Milette streets, to John F. Gleason, of the east side, and who is the owner of the "Carleton House" hotel, adjoining the new purchase.

For the purpose of an up-to-date hotel the site is in every respect a most desirable one. It has a complete view of the harbor and shipping and within but a few minutes walk of the delightful bathing beach at "Bestley's" favorite rendezvous of all who enjoy a dip in the briny during the summer months.

There is a further rumor that Mr. Gleason holds options on other lots in that vicinity.

The probability is strong that ere long there will be developments of an important character in that portion of the west side at least. Mr. Gleason, who is well known as one of the city's big men, in the real estate business, is being congratulated in having secured this Milette street property.
