MISTAKE MADE

BY THE A. A. U. OF C.

Amateur Sport in West Injured by Concession Made to Professionals

(Toronto Globe.)

Developments in the Canadian west indicate that a mistake was made by the A. A. U. of C. when it granted to four western provinces the right to reinstate professionals. The westerners demanded this privilege on threat of secession from the national governing body. Wholesale exculpations have been granted and scores of others have been applied for on quite the same grounds as those which have already been made. In view of what is happening and what is bound to follow, it would doubtless have been advisable for the A. A. U. of C. to have decided on a different course.

NATIONAL ATHLETIC HARMONY WOULD HAVE BEEN GIVEN A TEMPORARY SETBACK, BUT LEFT TO THEIR OWN DEVICES, THE WESTERNERS WOULD HAVE BROUGHT ABOUT A CONDITION THAT WOULD HAVE HURRIEDLY CONVINCED THE PROPOSERS OF THE HYBRID, FREE-AND-EASY REGULATION THAT THEY HAD ADOPTED A WRONG COURSE. THE TRUE FRIENDS OF AMATEUR SPORT IN ITS BEST SENSE WOULD HAVE LOST NO TIME IN AGAIN SEEKING THE COUNSEL AND PROTECTION OF THE GOVERNING BODY. EVEN AS IT IS, THE WHITEWASHED PROFESSIONALS ARE BARRED FROM CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS IN HOCKEY, TRICK AND FIELD BOXING, AND ALL OTHER SPORTING ACTIVITIES UNDER THE CONTROL OF THE A. A. U. OF C.

IN THE EVENT OF A TEAM USING HALLS-AND-ALLS, THE REINTEGRATED PROFESSIONALS WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE TO COMPETE. THERE WILL DOUBTLESS BE, IN THE COURSE OF TIME, A REVISION TO THE FORMER CONDITION OF AFFAIRS, BUT NO GOOD WILL BE DONE BY CASE OF UNATHELETIC HARMONY. THE NATIONAL GOVERNING BODY HAS TAKEN A BACKWARD STEP. THE WORK OF YEARS IS UNDONE. ITS HERETO UNALTERABLE OPPOSITION TO THE REINTEGRATION OF PROFESSIONALS, STRENGTHENED BY A CLAUSE IN ITS CONSTITUTION WHICH MADE THE ENTERTAINMENT OF APPLICATIONS FOR REINTEGRATION OF PROFESSIONALS A MATTER BEYOND ITS JURISDICTION, HAS BEEN SWALLOWED WHOLE. THE SLOGAN "ONCE A PROFESSIONAL, ALWAYS A PROFESSIONAL" IS IN THE DISCARD. FORTUNE OF THEIR OWN MAKING IS DESCENDING UPON THE HEADS OF THE A. A. U. OF C.
