POLICE MATTERS.

Commissioners Will not Act on
Ald. Cowan's Charges.

Tenders for Coal Called for—Basement
of the Police Station to be put
in a Sanitary Condition.

There were present at this morning's session of the City Police Commissioners, the chairman, Judge Houston, Judge Bell, Mayor Smith and Chief of Police Young.

On motion of Judge Bell and Mayor Smith it was decided to advertise for tenders for coal to be in within a week, coal to be weighed on the town scales. The chairman drew attention to the unsanitary condition of the police station, of which the board of health had complained.

On motion of Mayor Smith and Judge Bell, it was decided to proceed with the work under the supervision of the city engineer, tenders to be in as directed by the chief.

The regulations governing the department as revised by the chief, were adopted. The mayor suggested that under the direction of the chief, the city papers, summons, subpoenas, etc., be served by the police. The judge endorsed this suggestion.

The chairman stated that one of the city aldermen, from his seat in the council, had made some sweeping charges against the whole police force, to the effect that it was of no use. These had been reported in the press, and he thought it was advisable to have the clerk officially notify him to formulate his charges before the proper tribunal. The chairman said he referred to Ald. Cowan.

Judge Bell—I would pay no more attention to them than to the ordinary frothings of a man on the street. He has no business to make charges if he does not place them before the proper tribunal and cannot substantiate them.

Mayor Smith said he was not present at the meeting when Ald. Cowan

made his charges, but from his knowledge of the police department he did not think they could be justified.

Judge Houston suggested that the clerk notify Ald. Cowan asking him what grounds, if any, he had for his statements and that the commissioners would be pleased to have them submitted to the tribunal for investigation.

Judge Bell was opposed to taking any notice of the statements. "I find it best," he said, "to pay no attention to irresponsible talk. The way to formulate charges is to bring them before the commission."

The other members finally adopted this view of the matter.
