Convicted in Detroit of Causing a Girl's Death by Criminal Operation.

Alice S. Lonsdale. "M. D.," of Detroit, formerly of Chatham, was sentenced to five years in the Detroit House of Correction yesterday. She was convicted by a jury of causing the death of a girl by a criminal operation. When she entered the court room accompanied by her husband she appeared very much cut-up. However, by the time the court ordered her to stand up for sentence she had regained her composure and when asked if she had anything to say why sentence should not be pronounced, she quietly requested that she be allowed to wait for her attorney.

The court insisted on proceeding. "I think it is an outrage on the people of this state to convict and sentence an innocent person," she said. "I am not guilty. There is not one thing to substantiate the statements of Dr. Day. I am innocent of the charge and all who watched the trial will say so."

The woman's eyes filled with tears and she stopped long enough to choke back a convulsive sob. Judge Chapin then ordered her to stand up to receive the sentence of five person the House of Correction.

Halifax, August 12.—The Royal Templars of Temperance of the Maritime Provinces at their annual meeting yesterday unanimously passed the following resolution:

"Resilved, we cannoù too stronly denounce the present Administration for the non-fulfilment of its promises to the electorate of Canada, Notwithsicanding the result of the plebiscite which showed clearly the decision of the people for the enactment of a Dominion prohibitory law, the Government has chosen to utterly ignorate their pramises and pretentions. We would, therefore, recommend that a convention of the temperance electors of the Maritime Provinces be called to meet in some central location at an early date, in order that steps may be taken to the end that their flection in favor of Dominion prohibition as emphatically expressed at the polis may find expression in Isgialation. We recommend that this Grand Council instruct its Executive to correspond with other societies in the calling of such a convention."
