DYNAMITE OUTRAGE-TWELVE MEN KILLED

Infernal Machine Exploded While Miners Were Waiting to Board Train

Chipple Creek, Colo., June 6.—Twelve med were killed and seven others severes by wounded to-day by the explosion of an infernal machine at the railroad station at Independence, six miles from here. Eleven men were killed outright, being blown to pieces, and one died later. All the killed and wounded, with the exception of two men from the Deadwood mine, were miners employed on the night shift of the Findlay mine. The infernal machine with which the crime was committed, consisted of a quantity of dynamite, probably three hundred pounds, and a loaded revolver with a long, fine steel wire attached to the trigger. The revolver was fastened so that the pulling of the trigger would not draw it away. The wires ran from under the station to the cribing of the trigger would not draw it away.
