ANOTHER DEFEAT FOR THE BRITISH LIBERALS

Constituency Which Formerly Gave a Majority of 3,500 Now Goes Unionist.

LONDON, June 22--A bye-election was held Saturday in the constituency of Putney, London, which was won by the Liberal Unionist candidate, Mr. James Oddy, by a majority of 113.

The result is looked on as a great triumph for the Liberal Unionists.

The Franco-Canadian treaty, which is still hung up in the French senate, is named among the influences operating indirectly to bring about the remarkable defeat of the ministerialist in the Putney bye-election, Saturday.

The Morning Post says: "The election is recognizing now that a period of depression is setting in how important it is to arm themselves against foreign competitors and to establish preferential arrangements with the overseas dominions. The recent Franco-Canadian treaty shows the opportunity for achieving this vital object will not endure indefinitely, and the decay of confidence in the Liberal party and the rapid growth of the essential policy of union may bring a change of government sooner than expected."

COPPER WALL-PAPER. It is said that much complaint has always been made by occupants of damp houses in Calcutta on account of damp walls, especially in the rainy season of the year. To remedy this it is proposed to use a new kind of damp-proof paper made of "raw copper" and varying in thickness from 0.012 of an inch to 0.006. It is said to be capable of being worked into all sorts of patterns, to be insect-proof and damp-proof, and without being cleaned. It is used in the same way as wall paper. Ordinary wall-paper is of little use in the damp climate of Calcutta, and the new invention holds out many inducements.

JUSTICE MARTIN SAYS PROVINCIAL LAW IS VALID

British Columbia Divorce Court Upheld in Important Decision.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 22--To disturb the jurisdiction of the courts of this province in divorce and matrimonial matters, which has been exercised for the past thirty-one years, would be to create a social and domestic calamity. This is but one view expressed by Justice Martin after a judicial review covering that entire period in a fifty page judgment supporting this jurisdiction of the provincial courts.

It is perhaps the most exhaustive judgment ever handed down upon any question before the local courts. It will be used by the Attorney-General upon the appeal before the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council next month, an appeal necessitated by the adverse decision of Justice Clement, the only Provincial Supreme Court Judge holding an opposite view.

The jurisdiction is supported by Justice Martin from three viewpoints, first, by past judicial decisions upholding the practice and authority for it, back to the days of Sir James Douglas and Chief Justice Begbie, secondly, by frequently revised Supreme Court rules, which have ever received the sanction of the Legislature, before becoming operative and, thirdly, by the attitude of the Provincial Legislature with its various enactments regarding divorce and matrimony, as well as the attitude of the Federal Parliament, which has never repealed any of these provincial acts.



TRIAL OF STEVE ADAMS ON CHARGE OF MURDER COMMENCED.

GRAND JUDGE ADAMS, June 22--The trial of Steve Adams, a member of the Western Federation of Miners, charged with the murder of Arthur L. Collins of Telluride, mine superintendent, began in the district court today when the sheriff was ordered to summon 100 men for jury service. Charles H. Meyer, President of the Western Federation of Miners, is here and will remain throughout the trial.

COURT DECIDES STEAMERS MUST PAY THEIR FINE

Steamship Companies Fined \$200,000 for Landing Diseased Immigrants Lost Claim for Refund--Will Appeal

NEW YORK, June 22--Deciding that under the immigration law the Secretary of Commerce and Labor has the right to impose fines upon steamship companies bringing to this country aliens afflicted with a dangerous disease, whose unhealthy state was apparent at the place of embarkment, Judge Hough, of the United States Circuit Court, today filed a decision dismissing the test suits brought by two steamship companies to recover fines imposed under this clause in the law and paid under protest by the companies. The suits were those of the International Mercantile Marine Company and the Ocean Steam Navigation Company Limited, against N. N. Stranahan, collector of the port of New York.

As the sum involved in fines collected is more than \$200,000, the matter will be carried on appeal to the United States Supreme Court.

BALFOUR DISCUSSES RELIGION AND SCIENCE

LONDON, June 21--The delegates to the Pan-Anglican Congress filed Albert Hall tonight to hear ex-Premier Balfour in a discussion of "Christian truth and other intellectual values."

Mr. Balfour said that he could not conceive of human society being permanently deprived of the religious element, but he looked to science more than anything else as the great ameliorator of the human lot in the future. If he had to believe that the two great powers, religion and science, were in antagonism it would be impossible for him to avoid that hopeless despair which deprives labor of all its fruits and makes efforts for the betterment of mankind impossible.

A considerable item of the 1,000-ton cargo of the Laurentian was a shipment of 1,000 bags of peanuts from Glasgow, the first of its kind ever brought from that port to Boston.

CUSTOMS DUTY ON REPAIRS TO SHIPS

OTTAWA, Ont., June 22--Hon. Wm. Patterson has given notice of an important amendment to the customs act providing for a customs duty of twenty-five per cent. ad valorem on repairs to ships made in a foreign country and brought to Canada to be employed in the coasting trade here within one year after repairs are made. It is also provided that duty shall be levied on all equipments, including boats at the same rate of duty as if articles were imported in Canada in ordinary course.

This is in response to a request of Canadian shipbuilders who have strongly urged upon the government that American firms have been capturing most of the vessel repair trade and that vessels bought in the United States at a low price and then repaired there have on being registered in Canada paid duty only on the basis of the original price paid for the vessel.

PRINCE RUPERT NOTES.

Good Progress Being Made With Railroad Work.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 22--Continued fine weather during the week has greatly facilitated progress in every branch of construction on the Grand Trunk Pacific from Prince Rupert eastward, and while the contracts have not all been signed, it may be stated that Foley, Welch & Stewart have sublet all of their 100-mile contract, with the exception of about fifteen miles north of Gravelly Point. The steamer Caldonia made two trips during the week between Prince Rupert and Telegraph Point, with supplies and construction material for the camps along the route.

The carried 30 men each trip, who had been hired to work for the sub-contractors on their sections. Three slips have been made in the wharf in Foley, Welch & Stewart's big warehouse, so that boats can now be loaded quickly at any stage of the tide. It may be assumed that in two months from date of arrival at Prince Rupert of the first grading outfit, the whole of the first hundred miles of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway east from Prince Rupert is sub-let or portioned out; the largest contractors' supply house in the Pacific coast has been built; powder magazines erected; transportation facilities provided, and hundreds of men given employment at fair wages.

DEATH DISCOVERED A DAY AFTER IT OCCURRED

TORONTO, June 22--J. T. Johnston, former manager of the Toronto Typo Foundry, was found dead at his residence today. His friends found him in the house this afternoon with all the lights burning, indicating that he died on Sunday night.

The western weather is fair and cool, and the enormous quantity of water that fell last week will do little damage. Red River and the Assiniboine are in flood, and some damage has been done along their banks, boat houses and so forth being carried away.

It is now pretty certain that Hon. Nelson Monteth, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, defeated in South Perth, will retire from public life.
