#### LOCAL NEWS

Canton La Tour will meet at eight o'clock tomorrow evening in the West Side Oldfellows Hall.

The Carleton Cornet Band will meet at the band room at seven o'clock this evening.

There were four drinks on the police court bench this morning and they were all dealt with in the usual manner.

Sergeant Campbell reports that there is a flow of water on the corner of Pitt and Sheffield streets, caused by a broken pipe.

Policemen Rankine and Corbett were summoned to the Long Wharf last night to eject Stanley Brown from the tug Lord Kitchener.

The steamer Manchester Merchant, of the Manchester line, arrived in port this morning from Manchester with a general cargo. The ship had a fine passage.

A number of friends of Miss Katie Keenan surprised her with a novelty shower last evening in honor of a coming event in June. Miss Kate Kennedy, of Daughas avenue, was hostess, and a pleasant evening of music and games was passed.

The Star Line Steamship Company is planning to inaugurate a system of season tickets somewhat similar to that used by the railway for summer suburban traffic. The tickets will be available only for summer residents. It will result in a considerable reduction of fares.

The West End Every Day Club and the La Tour Section of the Temple of Honor are circulating petitions asking that water gates be placed in the Carleton mill pond, so as to provide a body of water that would always be available for aquatic sports. As a number of sewers empty into the pond the promoters suggest that the gates could be opened frequently to change the water.

The New Brunswick Tourist Association is about to revise its lists of boarding and lodging houses in the city and throughout the provinces, and in order that these lists may be as full and complete as possible, all in the city and throughout the provinces who are prepared to give accommodation to summer visitors are requested to make known the fact to the secretary, 85 Prince William street, St. John, N. B. Registration forms have been prepared, and a request personally or by mail will bring one of these, which when filled out will put the association in possession of information that may prove valuable and profitable to boarding house keepers in both city and country. It is desirable that those who should give information about drives, boating, bathing, fishing and other attractions in the vicinity. An early answer to this appeal will be appreciated.

#### STILL ON THE TRAIL OF HEBREW JUNK DEALERS

Bills and By-Laws Committee Meet This Afternoon to Discuss Further Legislation.

The bills and by-laws committee met in special session this afternoon to discuss civic legislation regarding the junk licenses. An attempt was made at the recent session of the provincial legislature to secure legislation along this line, but the bill was thrown out and the aldermen were advised that the city had sufficient power to deal with the matter. The proposed legislation is aimed at the itinerant junk dealers, most of whom are Hebrews. They objected to the previous attempt to limit their business, and it was largely due to the efforts of Rabbi Amdur that the bill was thrown out. This afternoon's meeting was called at the request of Ald. McGoldrick.

#### IN THE COUNTY COURT.

The non-jury case of Williams v. Harding was concluded in the County Court this morning and Judge Forbes gave a verdict for \$15.22 for the plaintiff. This suit is brought by S. A. Williams, contractor, against J. S. Harding, administrator of the estate of the late De Wolf Spurr, for work and labor done for Mr. Spurr on his house. The defence was that the work was executed. His Honor reduced the claim and gave a verdict as above. A. A. Wilson, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and W. Harry Harrison for the defendant. Assessment was entered in the case of DeForest v. Bureau. L. F. D. Tibbo appeared for the plaintiff. The court adjourned at noon to meet in chambers on Saturday morning next, when the remaining cases on the docket will be taken up.

#### ALDERMEN OFF TO INSPECT PAVEMENTS

The Haslam Company Will Pay the Bills.

Alderman Says St. John Men Can Lay Pavements Cheaper Than Any Foreign Concern.

A joint delegation of the civic representatives of St. John and Fredericton leaves tonight on a trip to Boston, Lowell and other New England towns as the guests of the Haslam Paving Company, of Worcester, Mass. The object of the trip is to give the aldermen a chance to inspect the pavements laid by the company and see how they work in actual use. They will also be given opportunity to see them in the course of construction. The company makes several kinds of pavements and in view of the proposed extension of permanent pavings in both cities are paying the aldermen's expenses on this trip in order that they may thoroughly investigate the merits of their products. Fredericton has already decided to have permanent paving on some of the principal streets, and such a movement is also on foot in St. John.

Residents of Germaln street have petitioned for pavements there, offering to pay one-half of the cost. There has always been dissatisfaction with both the wooden blocks and the Macadam system used in St. John, and a change might also be made in some of the streets which have the heaviest traffic.

The delegation from Fredericton will consist of the mayor, a couple of the aldermen and the city engineer. St. John will be represented by Ald. McGoldrick, Ald. Ekin, Ald. Vanwart, and Engineer Murdoch. They leave by the Boston express this evening and join the other contingent at Fredericton Junction.

While they are away the aldermen will also have their eyes open for other matters of interest which touch their various departments. Ald. McGoldrick, who still believes in wood block pavements, will investigate the system as used in other cities with a view to finding what preservatives are used to make the wood last longer.

Ald. Vanwart has heard of a new tire hose nozzle which can be controlled under a heavy pressure of water by one man instead of two and three, and he will look into its merits. Although they are expected to bring back quite a large bunch of assorted information.

One of the aldermen who is not so long characterized the trip as a "junket," and said that it would amount to a heavy pressure of water in wood block pavements, and that a company could be formed in St. John which could lay the same pavement at a lower price than any foreign company could do it.

Owing to the absence of the aldermen some of the regular board meetings will have to be postponed. The water and sewerage board will be held as usual on Wednesday, but the board will have been postponed until Friday and the safety board will probably meet on Monday of the following week to accommodate the others it is possible that the treasury board will be held over until the following Tuesday, and the council meeting until Wednesday, June 6th.

#### MONCTON TEAM TO PLAY HERE SATURDAY

The Moncton baseball team and the Marathons will meet on Saturday afternoon and evening on the Victoria grounds for two games of ball.

This is a good attraction for the baseball fans and doubtless a large crowd will witness the contests.

Both teams are in good shape and fast ball is expected. The Moncton team has a splendid lot of ball players and are always desirous of downing a St. John team. Their hitting is a feature, they are well worth watching, and is a big factor in helping them win their games. Their pitchers are speedy and the team as a whole are good batters. The local boys also are a hard hitting team, in fact, the Marathons are battling this season harder than ever.

For those who go to the games on Saturday a fast exhibition of the good old game may be expected.

The track team of the University of New Brunswick passed through the city at noon today on their way to Moncton, where the intercollegiate athletic meet will be held tomorrow. Robinson high and broad jumps. The Acadia team will arrive on the Digby boat this evening. Mount Allison is the third university participating.
