

ARE RUSHING "OVERNIGHT" BOOZE ACROSS

Artificially Colored Whiskey
Sells for \$140 a Case in
New York, Says Agent.

MAKING IT HARD FOR SMUGGLERS

Speeding Motors Stopped by
Powerful Searchlight Thrown
Into Drivers' Eyes.

Rouses' Point, N. Y., May 22.—Professional international whiskey runners contriving their activities in this part of the state, have received many setbacks during the last week due to increased activity by the United States Internal Revenue Bureau and raiding prohibition agents. Backed on hootch-running automobiles making the dash across the Canadian line at top speed have disclosed that much of the so-called "bonded" and "very old" whiskey is of poor quality, made overnight and touched up with artificial coloring and flavoring matter.

Much of this finds its way to New York City, the agents say, and is sold as the genuine article, "just off the ship." The average whiskey drinker readily is deceived, especially by the Scotch brands turned out by the bootleggers' mills. The labels are perfect copies and bottles are of the type used in the legitimate trade, but the contents usually is what the agents call "overnight" whiskey. It is made by artists at their trade, and tastes enough like genuine distilled whiskey to get by.

Get High Prices.

Here are the prices per case brought, by the fraudulently-labeled whiskey as revealed by a bootlegger's notebook seized in a raid:

Johnny Walker, \$50; Gordon, \$42; Haig and Haig, \$35; White Horse, \$48; MacKenzie, \$40; John Dewar's, \$50; Cuddy Brook, \$50; three Star Hennessey, \$37; Imperial, \$37, and John Dicks, \$39.

"This stuff sells in New York City at \$140 a case and sometimes commands a higher price," said Harold B. Dobbs, internal revenue agent with headquarters in Brooklyn who has been directing the government's campaign. "There is very little of it coming across the line just now because all the roads are covered and all other ways of bringing it in are closely watched."

The agents employ a simple method of bringing suspected automobile parties to a halt. A blinding spotlight is turned on the approaching machine from the centre of the road. The headlights of both cars drawn up along the roadside are turned on and the suspect is forced to stop or take a chance with the ditch. Generally they say, the lighting scheme is successful.

Had Pistol Duel.

"A few days ago," said agent Dobbs, "a car approaching at high speed came up 100 feet away from the spot light. Two men got out and ran into the woods. The agent who examined their car found it loaded, but discovered a good supply of whiskey in the trunk. Presently a bullet or two came out of the woods, and until the pistols had been emptied all around we had a battle in which neither side could see the other, aiming at the pistol flashes. The more desperate of these men would commit murder to get their goods across the line. Two days before bootleggers in an automobile of similar make shot a policeman in Plattsburg."

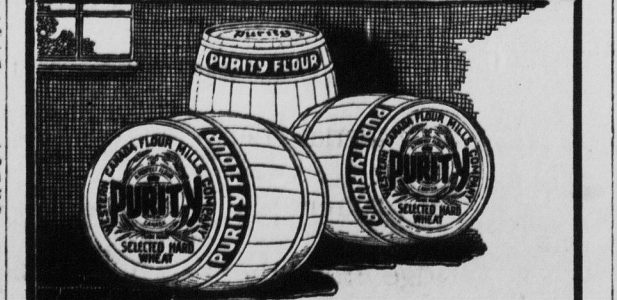

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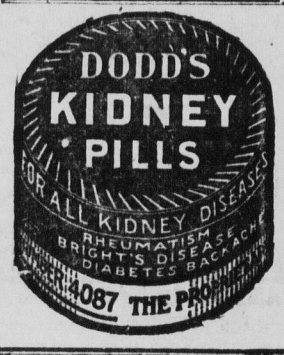

A PA J. W. V. LAWLOR WROTE PREMIER ABOUT VENIOT

Correspondence is Produced
by St. John Man Who
Initiated Matter.

ACTION TAKEN WAS
PURELY PERSONAL

Saw Mr. Veniot After He
Had Received Reply to Letter
to the Premier.

J. W. V. Lawlor, of this city, was the author of the letters sent to Premier Meighen last winter, suggesting the Hon. P. J. Veniot of New Brunswick for a seat in the Federal Cabinet. On Saturday the St. John Globe published the following letter from Mr. Lawlor admitting the authorship of the letter and giving his part in the controversy. The letter published is as follows:

"November 29th last I wrote Honorable Premier Meighen and suggested wisdom of giving French-Canadian of the Maritime Provinces recognition in the federal cabinet. As a citizen I had a perfect right to do so and neither told any person nor showed my letter, nor its contents to anyone. It was a purely personal matter. In reply I received the following perfectly harmless letter:

"Ottawa, Ontario, Dec. 1st, 1920
Dear Mr. Lawlor—I have just received your letter of the 29th November. I will discuss the subject to which you call attention with Mr. Wignmore. I have had no intimation whatever from the party to whom you refer as to his attitude towards the government or toward the paramount federal issues of the day.

That is the letter which Honorable Mr. Veniot is trying to make the public believe is an invitation to him to become Premier Meighen to become a member of his cabinet.

After receipt of that letter I had a conversation with a gentleman well known to Acadians and who takes a keen interest in their welfare, and we discussed "Acadian representation" and Mr. Veniot quite fully, and in parting he urged me to see Mr. Veniot at once. As he was a supporter and close friend of Honorable Mr. Veniot I followed his advice and wrote Honorable Mr. Veniot, asking what day he would be in St. John or Fredericton as I wished to speak of a personal matter. Before his reply reached me at St. John a business matter called me to Bathurst, N. B., where I work about three months a year.

"Meeting Honorable Mr. Veniot there we went to my room at the hotel and I explained my conversation with our mutual friend in St. John and his request to see Mr. Veniot at once. I made my position perfectly clear that I had no authority from anyone to even discuss with him or anyone else Acadian representation, but that, on my own behalf and because our mutual friend had so requested me to see him at once, I wanted to know if Acadian representation in the federal cabinet became a live issue and if he got the chance to accept it would he accept? I warned him that the Conservative and the Liberal but that the conversation was strictly private and confidential, and he agreed to so treat anything that passed between us.

"Now that Honorable Mr. Veniot has seen fit to attempt to make political capital out of that 'private and confidential conversation,' and an Honorable Mr. Meighen is being wrongly accused, I feel bound to give my views.
