

THOUSAND SEE FINE RACING AT MOOSEPATH

Exhibition Horse Contests Thursday Were Full of Interest—Belfry Chimes and Daisy Wilkes in a Great Struggle.

The first day's racing in the exhibition races at Moosepath Thursday was attended by a very large crowd in spite of the threatening weather and some showers. About 1000 people watched some of the best racing that has taken place here for some time. A special train left the city at 2 o'clock, and besides the number of followers of the racing game that went out this way, there were almost as many preferred to drive.

The light showers had tended to make the track a shade heavy. In spite of this, however, as will be seen by the summary, the time was any thing but slow. During the first part of the racing a stiff southerly wind was blowing across the track, but it died away making the race much more pleasant. While all the officials did their work to the entire satisfaction of those present, too much cannot be said of the thorough efficiency in which starter Power officiated. None but will admit that every opportunity was given the horses, it being necessary on this account to score them time and again that all might be "up."

A Great Struggle.

The feature of the day was the great struggle in the third heat of the 215 m. Belfry Chimes, the fast five year old stallion belonging to Thomas Hayes, of St. John, which had captured the wire at previous heats, went under the wire almost neck and neck with the chestnut mare, Daisy Wilkes, owned by Hugh O'Neill, of Fredericton.

The result was the cause of some little dispute, Cox, driver of the Fredericton horse, protesting that the black stallion broke as he came under the wire.

The feeling among the followers of both was keen for a time. Starter Power, however, announced that the judges had decided that Belfry Chimes had won and declined to consider Cox's protest, giving as a reason that Daisy Wilkes had broken some fifteen feet from the wire, and that her driver had done so, not to control her as, had he done so, Belfry would have won decisively.

In the other heats, however, "Chimes" seemed to have no difficulty in pulling away from the others, and the opinion was expressed by many horsemen present that the fine black stallion was not let out. In the third heat, on turning down the home stretch, he had considerable to spare on Daisy Wilkes. Mr. Hayes, however, seemed to take things too much for granted, and this seemed to be where he nearly lost the heat, as the Fredericton mare came down like a house afire. Then, how the crowd did roar. People jumped up in the grand stand and many were heard to say "give it to her Cox," and "she's got him beaten."
