Mothers the world over like to please their sons and Mississauga's Flying Mum is no different

At the urging of her sons, 73-year-old grandmother, Olive Ball, spent last summer learning to fly a glider. And if she can find the time next summer, she'll try for her glider pilot's licence so her sons can show off mother the pilot.

While some people feel apprehensive about flying in a commercial airliner, Mrs. Ball found soaring at 2,000 feet was a tranquil experience

Gliding is like riding a bicycle," Mrs. Ball says. "The trick is to stay on a cushion of air (called a thermal). Once you're off that thermal you glide round and round until you come down

You get up there and there is no sound of a motor just the whisper of air off the wings," she says. There are birds up there and it seems you move on your own steam. It's relaxing

Mrs. Ball started flying two years ago with her sons, Max and Graham. Max is a commercial airline pilot and Graham is a glider instructor. Max owns the Caledon Gliding Club where Mrs. Ball starts her ascent into the heavens.

My sons want me to take up gliding, says Mrs. Ball, who moved to Mississauga from Gloucestershire, England 30 years ago. I went up to please them. They thought I would be scared. I enjoyed it after the first

The only obstacle that could prevent Mrs. Ball from obtaining her licence is time. She lives a busy life which includes bowling. duties as president of the Mississauga senior citizens zone and organizing the Dixie Bells, a singing and dance group.

Tve tried nearly everything," says Mrs. Ball, who has climbed the Matterhorn on her European travels. "I like going up with my son in a two-seater plane and I might try

flying a plane.
"I had no intention of getting into it (gliding) further, but I'll try to get my licence if I have time. It's a hobby because it's a family hobby. All the family is interested in the air

Bruce and Glenn both lead their respective leagues in scoring. Bruce has scored 141 of his team's 236 points. Gary has contributed 24 points on four touchdowns.

Glen has 140 of the 218 points the Raiders have scored and Saturday's game

was the first time he hadn't scored at least 50 per cent of his team's points in a

"A lot of our plays are designed for him," says Glenn's coach Nick Villani who has coached him in three of the five years he has played. "If he gets outside there's no stopping him.

Bruce has just come into his own as a running back thanks to tips from Lorne Park coach Dave Turner. He says Turner taught him to run lower to the ground and told him when to cut to the outside on off-tackle plays.

"Last year, I got around six touchdowns and kicked the converts," he says." The year of experience with Mr. Turner has really helped me out."

Bruce decided against playing football two years ago because grade nine students were designated to a "taxi squad" at Lorne Park and didn't dress for games.

Now, he looks forward to playing senior ball next year with Lorne Park coach Dave Hart.

"I ran track with him for two years." says Johnston who finished fourth in the junior 400-metre final at OFSAA last year. "I know he's really a good coach.

But while Bruce moves up to senior, Gary will welcome Glenn to the junior team next year and has some tips for his younger brother.

"He has to be a lot more disciplined if he's going to be quarterback in high school," says the four-year MFL veteran. The offence is a lot more complicated but I think he can handle it.

But Glenn feels his size may be a drawback considering he only weighs 120 lbs. while his brothers weigh in about 150.
