

3664—**YOUNG, ARCHIBALD HOPE**—First Modern Language Master, U.C.C., 1889-92—Born at Sarnia, Ont., Feb. 6th, 1863. Completed his secondary school education at Upper Canada College, being head boy in 1882. Subsequently studied at University College, Toronto; Strassburg, and Trinity College, Toronto. Assistant Master Drummondville (Niagara Falls South), High School, 1884-5. Eighth assistant junior master and third modern language master at U.C.C., 1887-9. Second assistant house master, 1889-91. Lecturer modern languages and philology, Trinity College, Toronto, 1892-1900, and professor, 1900-3; professor of German, 1905, and acting professor of French, 1911-12, and special lecturer in Italian, Toronto University, 1909-10. Dean of Residence, Trinity, 1914 to date (1917). Advocated federation of Trinity with the University of Toronto. Member Congress of Historical Studies at Rome, Italy, 1903. Water color. Size 3 x 4. 3665—**FLOOR PLANS, UPPER CANADA COLLEGE BUILDINGS, 1830-91**—No. 1 shows residence of masters, with names of occupants, 1834-91. No. 2 gives the floor plans of college buildings, 1830-77, with rooms occupied by different masters. In the latter year the building was remodelled, plan 3 showing the floor diagram of building and rooms occupied by masters, 1877-91. Prepared by J. Ross Robertson, a pupil of the college, 1850-58.

3666—**UPPER CANADA COLLEGE, TORONTO, 1835**—South view—"Dedicated by permission to the Rev. J. H. Harris, D.D., principal of Upper Canada College, by his Obt. Hble. Servt. Thomas Young. Young, Arct. Delt., Toronto, U.C., 1835. J. H. Bufford, Del. on Stone. N. Currier's Lith. New York." The "Canadian Eton" was founded in 1829 by Major-General Sir John Colborne (Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada, 1828-36), who took an active interest in educational development in the province. In 1830-31 the college buildings shown in picture were erected on Russell Square, which was bounded by John, King, Simcoe and Adelaide streets. Additions were made in 1876-7, and in 1891 the College was removed to Deer Park. The King street site is now (1917) occupied by the Canada Foundry Company, the Royal Alexandra Theatre and various manufacturing establishments. The dwellings shown to the right and left of the picture were occupied by the college masters from 1834-91. Lithograph, colored. Size 9 x 18. See 270.

3667—**EARL ELGIN VISITS U. C. COLLEGE, TORONTO**—Presentation of bouquets and crest of College—With key. On 20th Oct., 1847, Earl Elgin, Governor-General of Canada, accompanied by the Countess of Elgin and her sister, Lady Alice Lambton, visited the college for the purpose of inspecting the school. The picture shows the Countess and Lady Lambton being presented with bouquets and also a copy of the well-known crest of the college, in color, done by a pupil in the drawing class. The presentation was made by Wm. Baines, son of Thos. Baines, Government Land Agent, and Chas. Nash, son of Richd. Nash, both residing on William street. The function took place in the great hall of the college, where the pupils assembled every morning for prayers before entering on the lessons of the day. The Earl wore his gown as a graduate of a British university. There is no record of the proceeding in any of the college archives, or in any of the newspapers of the period.
