" The Field of Bloot" at Jerusalem.—At a late soirie of the Dubin college of physicians, a highly interesting paper was read by Dr. Wilde, giving an account of a remarkable tomb discovered at Jerusalem, which he had in person examined; and from the remains found therein he was led to believe it to be the "Accldam, or field of blood," purchased with the 30 pieces of silver returned by Judas to the Jewish priests! The door way of this tomb was a mixed architecture, the pullars and pediment being Greeian : the floral embellish-ment on the architrare Hebrew, and the door pediment being Grecian: the floral embellish-ment on the architrave Hebrew, and the door itself solid stone, hung on horizontal hinges. Inside it was a large chamber hewn out of the solid rock, having smaller crypts in each of the three sides, in all of which human re-mains were found.
