

Maizs improved 6d. per quarter since Monday, and con-siderable quantities were sold at that ad-vance, but other varieties of feeding corn sold at former value. With small arrivals at ports of call during the week the floating eargo trade for wheat was dull and prices declined 6d per quarter. Maize, with a limited enquiry, was 3d to 6d per quarter lower. Barley was steady. Sales of English wheat last week, 53,672 quarters at 41s 4d per quar-ter, against 35,554 quarters at 51s 2d per quarter the corresponding week of the pre-vious year. The imports into the United Kingdom for the week ending May 17 amounted to 443,281 hundred weights of wheat, and 256,830 hundred weights of thour.




