Ottawa, April 12.—A soft answer turneth away wrath, it has been said, that the French-Canadian members of the Commons did not forget the aphorism when they came to express their views upon the bill to confer the franchise upon women which was taken up in committee in the Commons last night.
From them came the most determined opposition to the measure by the C has so far been heard. Truth to tell that the opposition was based upon familiar arguments, but its bitter ness was sweetened by fervid praise of woman's virtues.

"Woman is Heaven's message upon the earth," exclaimed one inspired orator, who was reluctant to see the angels' wings soiled and tat-tered in the turmoil of an election contest. The home is woman's proper sphere was an oft-repeated contention. Her emergence from that sphere to cast her ballot and hear the issues of a political conflict discussed upon the public platform demned the War Times Election Act, would be the cause of varied evils. cussed upon the public platform would be the cause of varied evils.
