**ENABLE WORKMEN TO OWN HOMES**

**Government Defines Policy for Reloading to Municipalities for Housing**

Important changes in the Ontario Government's housing policy which will make it possible for any workman to borrow Government money to build his own home, were announced by Sir William Hearst yesterday. Since the Dominion Government decided to place \$25,000,000 at the disposal of the provinces for reloading to municipalities for housing—thereby giving Ontario a call upon approximately \$8,000,000, the conditions under which the province will loan money have been under revision. The new conditions must be ratified, of course, by legislation, but they are issued as a definite guide to the municipalities which may accept them as the basis for immediate action where desirable.

The Government has laid down the principle that changes the direction of the whole housing policy. The original scheme sought to solve the housing problem by providing low-priced houses that could be rented at moderate rates. The new policy is just the reverse. With the object of encouraging people to own their own homes the Government is declaring, in principle, against the erection of houses with Government money for renting purposes, though exceptions are provided for.

The announcement of the Prime Minister states that a municipality securing Government money may make a loan to a person who owns his own land and builds a house for his own occupation up to the full value of the building—a limit of \$2,500 for the building, being subject to a general condition for both individuals and companies, the purpose of course being to provide the low-priced houses so urgently needed. A farmer may get a similar loan to build houses for employees.

A loan may also be made to a person for the erection of a house on land owned by the municipality provided he contributes in cash the value of the lot or 10 per cent. of the whole cost.

**BELGIUM FIELD FOR CANADIAN TRADE**

**Reconstruction Work There Offers Great Opportunities for Dominion**

London, Dec. 11.—The largest immediate opening for Canadian trade and industry is in relation to the reconstruction of devastated areas in Belgium, France and Serbia. This is in the general charge of the committee International Revitalization, which is a reconstitution of the international War Purchasing Committee, Canada is to be represented on this by Mr. Lloyd Harris. A preliminary survey shows that for Belgium and France there will be urgent need for large quantities of these goods.

Outer garments, all kinds of cheap durable material, denim or duck, boots and shoes, stoves, burners, coal, cooking utensils, household furniture, especially iron beds and ready-made houses, knocked down. Apart from clothing, a part of which can be supplied from Britain these supplies can only be obtained in available time from Canada and the United States. The reconstruction committee will have to determine the extent of supplies needed and finance their purchase wherever they can be obtained, arrange for the shipping and provide for their distribution.

The methods are not worked out but it is expected that whatever proportion of total supplies is allotted to Canada will be purchased on the order of the international Commission by the Canadian War Trade Board through the War Purchasing Commission. It will be necessary for the Canadian Government to advance the credits to cover a proportion of these purchases, perhaps fifty per cent. In the first instance, this vast volume of buying will be done by the Allied Governments, but ultimately the debt will be liquidated from Germany's payment for the reconstruction of areas devastated by her armies.

Mr. Harris has made arrangements to visit the Belgian and French areas to enforce himself by personal enquiry as to the possible extent of the opportunity for Canadian goods, but his trip has had to be postponed owing to indisposition. Unoubtedly there is a large opening here for Canadian goods, but conditions as to price, shipping facilities and need of credits can be met in the necessary time. There will be necessity for promptitude as the need for these supplies will be greatest during the next three or four months.

**New Waterproofing Oil.**  
 A French oil for waterproofing leather, cloth, paper and other materials is a mixture of eight parts of amyl acetate and four of castor oil, with one part of sulphur chloride stirred into it. Though this form a jelly, giving off hydrochloric acid, it liquefies after being kept tightly covered a few days, and the acid being then neutralized with barium carbonate, gives a colorless solution on filtering. To make a varnish, nitrocellulose is dissolved in the liquid after the addition of alcohol or benzine.

**Get Furnishes Milk and Churn.**

It consists of a bag of goat skin suspended from a tripod of poles.
