ENGLAND'S BLACK ARMY.

The full strength of Great Britain's Indian army is 300,000 men, of whom 230,000 are native and 70,000 British soldiers. In addition to this military force there are about 20,000 enrolled European volunteers, and a native police, officered by white men, nearly 200,000 strong.

Every regiment is divided into ten companies, each of which is usually made up of a different nationalitysuch as Goorkhas, Sikhs, Dogras Pathans and Punjaubis. It is owing to this premution that a combination of forces for the purpose of mutiny becomes almost impossible. The Goorkhas and Skhs, whose loyalty is rated the highest, are, in some localities, permitted to constitute entire regiments by themselves.

The pay of the Sepoy, or native soldier, is 18s per month, with a gradual increase after three years good conduct service. The pension system is particularly liberal, and is really the magnet which draws the native cruit. When a sepoy soldier falls in action, his wives-and there are four of them-are all pensioned, as well as their young children. As regards the artillery branch of the Indian army, white men only are employed, both as commissioned officers and in the ranks, and the guns of all forts are entirely manned by Britons.

THE DOMINION ELECTION.

Frank Oliver, M. P., editor of the Edmonton Bulletin, is very much too independent to be in the confidence of the leader of his party, Sir Wilfrid Laurier. But Mr. Oliver is a keen observer, and he now thinks that the general election is not quite so near as it was to be held a little while ago. The following article from the Bulletin will be found interesting.

No doubt the idea that an election was an immediate prospect had a great deal to do with the interminable character of the debate, but an election within the next six or eight months is not so certain now as it was at one time thought to be. The life of parliament does not expire until some time in August, 1901. The census is to be taken at the beginning of that year. On the basis of the census there is, under the constitution, a reallotment of representation. It would certainly be possible to have the work of the cengus complete in time, so that parliament, which opened, say, on Jan. 2, 1901, could make the reallotment called for by the results of the census and gust. In that case the new parliament would represent the new arrangement as defined by the census. But if an election is held this year -if the parliament so elected lives out its full term of five years; half of the next ten years' census period will b occupied by a parliament which does not represent the people as they stood practically at the time of its election. This means more in the west probably than in the east, but it means a great deal everywhere. The west confidently expects to be entitled to eight or ten more representatives or the basis of the next census, and to be out its full term of five years, half of nearly five years would be a very considerable hardship which should be avoided if possible. The census would also give every reason for making such redistribution in Ontario as is claimed by the Liberals to be necessary t overcome the iniquities of the so-called gerrymander act. Suppose the census to be taken and the redistribution to be made according to it, and the senate should throw out the bill as it has already done with the two attempts to redistribute the Ontario constituencies there would then be a very good cry to use the senate in the appeal to the country, while if the senate allowed the bill to pass the Liberals would stand to gain by whatever advantage may result from the readjustment of the gerrymander of which they complain so strongly. Out of about 70 eclipses of the sun which have occurred some where in the world within the nineteenth centhere have been only eight total clipses of more or less duration visble on the North American continent. The others happened in places often emote from civilization and some imes in entirely inaccessible localiies, as over the ocean areas. After the eclipse of May - 28th, no other eclipse track will fall in this country till June 8, 1918, when one will pass from Oregon to Florida, two minutes n durátion. Another will fall in New England on Jan. 21, 1925. Eclipses seven minutes in duration will occur in India in 1955, and in Africa in 1973, he longest for 1,000 years.

Sandon, B. C., recently destroyed by fire, is to be rebuilt, and is to rise from its ashes, not as a mining camp, but as a substantial city. The project is to run a sixty-foot street down the middle gulch, using the creek as a sewer and subway for the water mains, electric light wires and tele phone and telegraph wires. The town site will be re-surveyed, the streets and lots will be re-arranged, and solid buildings will be erected so that the danger of another similar fire may be guarded against. The real estate will be handled by an ingenious scheme. A trustee will be appointed who will take over the lots, and issue scrip for their assessed value, and this scrip will be taken in payment for lots in the new survey. In a number of cases there will be little change in the lots, as it will be necessary only to reverse the frontage.
