



Hand lists or posters were printed as early as 1468 by Jonathan Mentel (or Mentelin) of Strassburg, who printed the first edition of the Bible in 1468 or 1466. The first catalogue in England was printed in 1595 by John Winder for Andrew Manusell a booksales. for Andrew Maunsell, a bookseller.-Minneapolis Journal.
