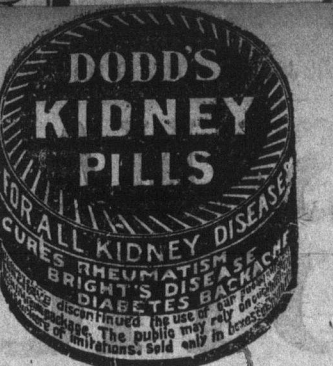

The Poisonous Black Sea.
The Black sea, which in some parts has a depth of more than 6,500 feet, is poisoned by sulphureted hydrogen wherever the water is deeper than 1,200 feet. This accounts for the curious fact that there is no organic life below that depth, excepting perhaps some bacteria of very low order, impregnated with sulphur. The causes for this phenomenon are explained by the quick outflow of the fresh water through the Bosphorus, while salt water coming from the Mediterranean enters through a deeper current into the depths of the Black sea. The waters on the surface are, therefore, controlled absolutely by horizontal currents of considerable force, and vertical currents which may carry the noxious gases from the bottom to the surface and fresh oxygen from the surface to the bottom are hardly ever noticeable. The water at great depths is so saturated with sulphuric gas by the disintegration of organic matter sinking to the bottom by reason of its weight that no fish or other living being which needs oxygen for its organic system can exist beyond a stated depth.

EARL'S HEIR A COWBOY.

Hon. Francis Clements Flees to Texas From London Society.

Although her presumptive of his brother, the Earl of Leitrim, the Honorable Francis Clements was recently discovered on an American liner working his way as a stoker. He is now in Texas seeking work as a cowboy.

Born in 1885 and a sailor by profession, the Honorable Francis does not plead poverty as a reason for his entry into the ranks of the world's workers. Rather it is his experience of the "artificial and unreal" life of London drawing rooms which has convinced him that if he did not remove himself

as far as possible from their pernicious influences his life "would ferment into mere froth, like those of the nobility around him."

He is determined to earn his own living, and as a Clements he has no lack of determination. He is a great-nephew of the famous third Earl of Leitrim, who was shot dead on the roadside in Donegal one night in 1878. The "suppression" was an act of revenge for the old Earl was as hard with his tenants as he was quarrelsome with his relatives.

All the property he could bequeath elsewhere than to his nephew, the father of the Honorable Francis, he did. Litigation thereafter lasted for thirteen years in the Dublin courts. When, however, the fourth Earl, father of the present Lord Leitrim, left more than \$650,000.

SERVIAN PRINCE IN LONDON.
"Bad Boy of Europe" Enjoying Sights of English Metropolis.

London is at present entertaining one of the most interesting personalities in Europe—the crown prince of Serbia, formerly known as the "Bad Boy of Europe," and "His Highness the Hoiligan."

Prince George is traveling incognito, and since his arrival he has been sightseeing like an ordinary tourist.

Country cousins visiting the Tower of London recently, puzzled their heads over the identity of the enthusiastic foreign-looking youth with close-cropped hair, prominent nose and swarthy face, who wanted to see "everything as quickly as possible."

He wore a Panama hat, a lounge suit and brown boots, and he might have passed for an ordinary foreign tourist but for the fact that the three men who accompanied him showed him a certain deference.

Seeing the Sights.
Little did the visitors guess that he was the representative of that Kara-georgievitch dynasty which again ascended the Serbian throne after that terrible coup d'etat of June, 1903, when King Alexander of Serbia and Queen Draga were ruthlessly murdered at Belgrade.

It was only natural that the crown prince, who is now 25 years of age, should visit the Earl's Court Exhibition. He has become more subdued of late, and although he took a childish delight in the water chute—which he declared should be twice as steep—and insisted on his suite being photographed with him on picture postcards, he made a very favorable impression on several Serbian gentlemen who are not favorably disposed toward the present dynasty.

One of these said that the young prince had undoubtedly begun to recognize his responsibilities. At present, as he is still a King of Spain, and still very excitable, he has a frank, simple manner and a capacity for enjoyment which arouse a certain amount of admiration.

Some of His Plans.
Formerly he led his tutors an uneasy life. He was a French disciplinarian, who had the honor of "instructing" the prince for a time, was considerably damaged, mentally and physically, by the time he had finished with him.

On one occasion King Peter was so incensed over the gross insult which the unruly George had offered his tutor that he sentenced his son to ten days' imprisonment in a fortress. But the prince escaped by scaling a wall, and later on broke a bottle over his tutor's head.

The prince's escapades at music halls and theatres and his wild doings generally have caused many scandals in Belgrade, but every one is now agreed that he is turning over a new leaf.

There is no question of state in connection with the amiable young prince's visit to England.

The First Rothschild.
Frankfort is easily one of all the towns of Germany in the abundance of texts for the eloquence of British journalists. Although the Jews are practically the creators of the money, their emancipation is a matter of yesterday. When Amschel Rothschild was born in 1772 in a wretched slum in the Judengasse the Jews were still shut up every night in their own quarters. He lived to be twenty before he saw his family, now lords of the earth, permitted to live freely in any street they liked. By 1812, when Amschel died, the Jews had by their banking houses transformed the town from a decaying medieval memory into a great banking center.

Stricken Farming In South Africa.
Nineteen permits to capture ostriches for domestication and farming purposes were issued during the year. These permitted the capture of 843 ostriches.

Ostrich farming, says the report, "is becoming quite an industry in the Enkeldoorn district, and I have recently been approached for Government aid in providing farmers with fencing wire, and a proposition is being laid before the Administration with a view to this."

When Gunpowder Was New.
A curious feature about the evolution in methods of hunting was the hesitation with which gunpowder was taken up by the great nobles. Not only did it take quite a century to familiarize hunters with it, but the evidence that has come down to us shows that the humble classes were the first to use it for shooting game. Maximilian, ardent sportsman that he was, tells us himself that he could shoot farther and with greater accuracy with his crossbow than his keeper could with the fire tube. To prove this he tells us the well known story of a certain chamberlain standing at 200 fathoms, which, after being pronounced as too far off by his henchman, who was armed with one of the first sporting firearms mentioned in print, comes tumbling down, pierced at the first attempt by the emperor's bolt. From other sources we learn of strict measures being adopted to prevent poachers and "wood loafers" using firearms, and this at a period when prices still used the cumbersome crossbow and spear. It was only in the last quarter of the sixteenth century that firearms had ousted other weapons for certain forms of the chase, the deer battle being among the latter—Gentleman's Magazine.
