FAVORS CHURCH UNION

General Assembly Adopts Report After Prolonged Debates.

Heresy Hunters Object to Dr. Gordon's Appointment at Montreal College—Dr. Sedgwick Leads the Attack—Court of Orthodox Needed—Genesis not Myth—Principal Scrimger Defends Liberal Views.

Montreal, June 12.—The heresy hunters strained at the leash in the general assembly yesterday morning, but failed to arouse much sympathy. Rev. Dr. Sedgwick and J. K. MacDonald were the chief spokesmen against the appointment of Rev. Alexander R. Gordon, Dundee, to the chair of Old Testament literature and exegesis in the Montreal College.

Principal Scrimger read letters rating Mr. Gordon highly as an Old Testament specialist. Dr. Sedgwick produced a copy of the Hibbert Journal for October, 1905, containing an article by Mr. Gordon on "The Religious Value of Genesis." The views there set forth startled him he could not acquiesce in this appointment as Genesis was represented as a mass of myth and legend. A myth was nothing but a fairy-tale.

Dr. Turnbull moved, Rev. George MacArthur seconding, to remit the question to a committee to report.

Principal Patrick, who was a personal friend of Mr. Gordon, asked who was to define the orthodoxy of the article. It could not be settled by that or any court. The only way was free discussion by reverent and believing men. Moreover, it was his own standpoint, and was taught in every college of the church but one.

"More's the pity," said Dr. Sedgwick.

Freedom to Express Views.

Principal Scrimger asked where could a competent man be found who would not ask freedom to express his views. Dr. Sedgwick did not follow his own views to a logical conclusion, but had taken the opportunity to attack a stranger. If he was ignorant he was not in earnest.

Dr. Sedgwick demanded a retraction, and Dr. Scrimger said Dr. Sedgwick had taken no pains to get the views of other professors. This was still more offensive to Dr. Sedgwick, who insisted on a withdrawal. As far as the stock of the assembly, Dr. Scrimger conveyed any imputation on Dr. Sedgwick's integrity. Dr. Scrimger withdrew it. He thought a profound mistake would be made by taking any action which would proclaim the church obscurantist. Students must be enabled to judge for themselves. The Westminster confession, to which Mr. Gordon must subscribe, did not mention for anyone to adopt the views desired by Dr. Sedgwick. Were they going to impose new standards of subscription?

The amendment was negatived and the appointment confirmed. Dr. Sedgwick dissenting.

By a vote of 137 to 11 the motion presented by the committee on church union was carried by the Presbyterian General Assembly at midnight last night.

The motion was to send their report to the lower courts for their suggestions. Rev. John MacKay withdrew his amendment in favor of Dr. Barclay's amendment to the amendment, which was to send the report of the union committee to sessions, presbyteries and congregations, and that they be requested to fully consider and to express their judgment upon the whole question.

CATTLE WAR IN IRELAND.

Posses of Police Stopped—Firearms Used in Skirmish.

Dublin, June 12.—The grazing war is spreading rapidly and becoming popular.

The most serious affair thus far was near Athlery, Galway, at midnight Monday. A large posse of police opposed a crowd of persons who were driving cattle off a farm. The people stoned the officers, several of the men being badly hurt, and the sergeant in command ordered the posse to fire. The latter fired repeated volleys at the crowd, and the raiders returned the fire, finally compelling the posse to retreat, when the graziers finished their raid.

Two or three farmhouses have been fired into at night recently.

The general sympathy of the masses is with the people, even in the case of many public officials, which factifies the Government's hands.

MURDERED AS A SPY.

St. Petersburg, June 12.—The body of a youth found yesterday in a wood in the suburbs of St. Petersburg, with his throat cut and face unrecognizably mutilated, has led to the discovery of an open air bomb factory with a large quantity of explosives near by.

Tried to Wreck Train.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 12.—According to the statement of railroad officials an attempt was made Saturday to wreck the southbound Southern Pacific overland train, a short distance north of this city.

A track walker found a heavy log-chain bound across the rails at a siding switch, which, if not discovered, would have thrown the train off the track.

The scene of the attempt was three miles from the river station to Los Angeles, and a short distance from West Glendale, where a passenger train was recently thrown off a trestle through the alleged efforts of train wreckers.

A freight train passed over the track an hour before the chain was discovered.

LOWERED FRENCH FLAG.

Mayors Resign Throughout Country—Gendarmes Called Out.

Montpelier, France, June 12.—After the announcement of the resignation of the municipal council here on Monday evening in connection with the wine growers' program, the arrest of a youth for carrying a banner bearing the inscription: "March on Paris; Long Live the Revolution," led to serious disorder. Hussars were called out and charged the people repeatedly. A number of persons were injured, and calm was only restored by the release of the prisoner.

Narbonne, France, June 12.—In the presence of an enormous crowd Monday night the mayor announced publicly that a civil strike had begun, and hauled down the flag of France from the city hall, replacing it with a long crepe streamer.

The discontent caused among the men of the 100th Regiment of Infantry by their confinement to barracks for the last five Sundays, on account of the wine growers' manifestations, was brought to a head Monday night by a dispute between the private and the non-commissioned officers, who tried to pull down men from a wall whence they were cheering passing trains loaded with wine growers going to Montpellier.

The soldiers informed their colonel that they absolutely refused to march against their friends and relatives.

Mayors Resign Seats.

Paris, June 12.—Up to a late hour Monday night no change had been recorded in the situation growing out of the movement on the part of the wine growers, and the news received from the south shows that a number of mayors are carrying out their resolve to resign, with calmness and determination. No disorders, however, have been reported.

INSURANCE DECREASES.

Work of Commission Has Had Considerable Effect.

Ottawa, June 12.—The returns of the life insurance companies for the year 1906, as furnished to the Department of Finance, shows that the commission of enquiry in Canada and in the States into insurance methods and the uncertainty created thereby has reacted to a considerable degree upon the business, not alone of the American companies, but of the Canadian companies as well.

The amount of new insurance taken up last year in the Canadian companies was \$28,898,343, which represents an increase of \$4,539,798, as against 1905. The business of the American companies, however, is even worse hit. The new insurance effected by them last year was \$28,093,494, which is \$5,392,831 less than it was the year before.

In the business of fire insurance, the Canadian companies show net cash receipts from premiums of \$8,674,135, and losses paid to the amount of \$6,667,377.

WILL NOT DISCRIMINATE.

Great Britain Will Secure Same Advantages As Germany.

LONDON, June 12.—Foreign Secretary Grey informed the House of Commons yesterday that the United States has officially assured His Majesty's Government that he did not wish to make the administration provisions of the German commercial agreement the basis for discrimination against any other state, and was willing to apply them to Great Britain if she so desired.

The secretary added that he was communicating with the board of trade, with the view of making the necessary arrangements.

Sir Edward Grey later announced that negotiations with the United States, the nature of which he was unable to disclose, were proceeding under section 3 of the Dingley Act.

Replying to questions on the subject, the secretary said he hoped to secure for Great Britain the same advantages as Germany had derived.

CREW'S NARROW ESCAPE.

St. John, N. B., June 12.—The American schooner Alma, lath loaded, sprang a leak in the Bay of Fundy, six miles off this city yesterday, and filling, lurched to one side and upset. A gale was blowing and a steamer passing saw the crew clinging to a portion of the deckload on the vessel's side, and offered assistance, but the crew refused to leave. Finally the gale got so bad they were glad to leave when another steamer came along.

TIMBER LANDS FIRE SWEEP.

Toronto, June 12.—Word was received yesterday by the Provincial Land Department that forest fires had broken out in the Townships of Soeble and Parpoonge, on the Port Arthur, Duluth and Western Railway. These townships are partly settled, but the greater part is covered with jackpine. Deputy Minister White had no information as to how serious the fires are, but expects more news to-day.

SECOND CHILD DROWNED.

Brockville, June 12.—Margaret Lafaver, the three-year-old daughter of C. J. Lafaver, who resides up the river, strayed from home to the bank of the stream, where she fell in and was drowned.

This makes the second drowning accident visited upon the family in a year, the other being the loss of a son, aged 10.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRES IN WEST.

Port Arthur, June 12.—Bush fires in this district are destroying a great deal of timber along the Duluth Extension Railway. The fire is now burning close to the Village of Hyman, and if the wind changes it will be wiped out. It is feared the lumber camps will be destroyed.

Tornado Sweeps Illinois.

Duquoin, Ill., June 12.—A tornado passed over this section last night, doing heavy damage. It is reported there has been loss of life.

A tornado swept this town Friday night, blowing down many houses and destroying crops.

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SEEDING IN ALBERTA.

In township eight, range 26, west of 48, last year there were seeded 1,400 acres to Spring wheat, and 340 acres to Fall wheat. Both averaged about 25 bushels to the acre, the Fall drought being mainly responsible for the small yield of the latter grain. It is thought that this year in the same township the acreage plant to Spring wheat will be reduced 20 per cent. over last year, but the acreage taken as a whole will be about the same as last year, being made up in coarse grains.

Farmers are still seeding, but another week will see this work about finished. Although the spring has been unusually cold and backward, there has still been considerable growth, early spring wheat being in most cases two inches above the ground, but some fields have made doubtful growth.
