Canada's Trade with Great Britain. Hon. John Carling, minister of agriculture, at a banquet in Toronto recently, gave the following statistics regarding the trade of Canada with Great Britain:

For three years we have shipped on an average 60,000 head of cattle to England annually, and this year we will ship 115,000. But we do not begin to supply the English markets which take 350,000 head per annum.

Matters in relation to the Indian scare in the United States are assuming a serious aspect. At Indian headquarters in Chicago telegrams have been received from Gen. Brooks, commanding the forces at Pine Ridge, hopeful of inducing the disloyal Sioux to abandon their tribe and join the loyalists.

Great preparations are being made in Australia for the forthcoming Australasian Federation Convention, in which all the Australian colonies of Great Britain will be represented, and the meeting of which will be the first step towards a national organization that is intended to include all those colonies in one powerful union represented in a federal parliament.

The population of the United States is rapidly increasing, and with the appropriation to be made at the next session of Congress, it is estimated the figures will exceed \$200,000,000. A general income tax to provide for this enormous expenditure is already being discussed, with a probability of direct taxation of the necessities of life.

The operations in connection with our water-works are approaching completion, and when finished we will have one of the very best systems in the Province.

How to Ship Eggs to Great Britain.

In view of attempts being made on the part of Canadian exporters of eggs, to open up trade with Great Britain, the following brief summary prepared by the London, England, correspondent of The Grocer and General Shopkeeper, Toronto and Montreal, will be of great value:—

SOURCES OF SUPPLY. The trade here is eagerly competed for by the neighboring continental countries, such as France, Holland, and Denmark, every facility in point of quick despatch and cheap freightage being given by the respective railways and steamship companies.

In many cases the eggs get into consumption within a week after leaving sources of supply, thus ensuring the produce arriving in such a condition as to secure the full advantages of the market.

MARKET. As may be imagined, in a country like our own, which gives but little attention to dairy culture, there is an extensive scope for foreign supplies. Supplies all find a ready demand, prices varying according to the condition of the trade.

Supplies so far have not overtaken demand, but circumstances point to the fact that any large influx of eggs would have to be introduced with the greatest caution, and by those firms possessing a knowledge of the handling of the trade.

They vary according to the season of the year, but may roughly be said to vary on best selected qualities from 6s. to 10s.; medium 7. 6d. to 8s. 6d. Small parcels of Canadian, as a novelty, have found buyers as high as 10s. to 10s. 6d., but with regular supplies prices would soon find their own level.

These are chiefly due to the necessarily longer transit, compared with Continental supplies. Whatever facilities of cheap and rapid freight transit are provided by those steamship lines anxious to pioneer the trade, the undoubted extra cost, which must of necessity be incurred before regular channels of out-let are found and the trade shapes itself into a groove, necessitate that the eggs should be in the best condition as the best French qualities, to insure their obtaining that average level of price which we estimate would pay Canadian exporters.

These can only be acquired by experience which will have to be bought, and it will not be until shippers have been able to grasp full details of the various requirements of our trade, that full market value can be obtained for their shipments.

That the requirements of this market are not understood is shown by the one or two sample shipments, either arriving in ingeniously constructed boxes, compartmented, or in ordinary sized barrels, both packing being of far too expensive a character to compete with the more economical and at the same time more effective method adopted for bringing eggs to this market from the Continent.

Provided shipments of supplies are controlled, and shippers generally avoid showing too great anxiety to cultivate business, we have every reason to believe a trade can be effectually worked up on a sound basis. It is certain, however, that before establishing their business here, Canadian shippers will have to pay their footing and proceed very cautiously in their competition against those other suppliers who possess a highly organized system for fighting fresh comers.

Canada claims to have produced the largest cheese in the world. From the Ingersoll factory was lately turned out a cheese weighing seven thousand pounds. It was six feet ten inches in diameter, three feet in height and twenty-one in circumference. It required the milking of seven thousand cows or thirty-five tons of milk to produce it.

A big regatta is talked about in Halifax to be held at Bedford Basin next summer. The leading boating men of America and, if possible, those of Australia, will be induced to come. It will be a sort of Aquatic Carnival.

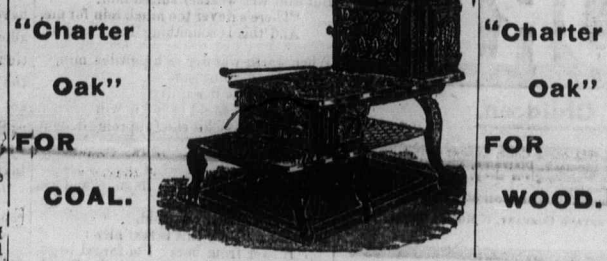
