Wolfville Boy's Letter.

The following is a letter received this week by Mrs. (Rev.) C. P. Wilson from her son Harold, who is serving with the St. F. X. Stationary Hospital, at present in England:

No. 9, St. Hosp., Care of Military Hospital, Bramshott, England.

Dear Mother:—Here it is Tuesday night, so you will see I am a couple of days behind with my letter this week but as you read on you will ascertain the reason.

Well just after I had written your letter a week ago I received the bunch of papers dated the 9th. I sent you a photo card of a zep, that was destroyed. I hope you will have received it.

This Stationary Hospital is no 'safety first' job. I know of two hospital that have been shelled.

I think you would find it interesting if you would take 'The Lady of the Lake,' read it through and follow it with those post cards I sent you and the books. I will go to Ireland all right if I get a chance. Some of our boys went there and visited the Lakes of Killarney and kissed the Blarney Stone in Blarney Castle.

I suppose college opens by this time. Would like to step in and see the girls and boys. Be sure and write good long letters as it takes them so long to come.

Well, we left Bramshott a week ago today. We were about six hours on the train. This hospital was run by the Imperial Government but since we have taken it over it will be run exclusively by Canadians. It contains about seven hundred beds. There are Australian, Imperial and Canadian patients in it. When we first came here we had our rations from the Army Service Corps and were in big marquees, only seven to a tent with real spring beds; but when we were in Chenton we had eight in a little bell tent. I have been working very hard since I came back from Northampton yesterday afternoon. I haven't had time to write until now. My friend Sloan, from Kentville, is in the officers' mess right next door. No I get an occasional feed from him.

Well, we are in huts for winter quarters now, so let her rain. I happened to go in the officers' cook house today and here was Spiddell, from Kentville, talking to Sloan, so I went in. He is attached as Chaplain to the Provisional Battalion. Claude Smith, Dr. Smith's son, is in the hospital here.

Well, I must tell you why I did not write Sunday. Friday night, about ten o'clock, we were told we were going to Northampton to play Saturday morning, at eleven, we set out for the station with six other players besides our own. We arrived in London, at Waterloo station, and crossed in the tubes just in time to catch the train. Our station here is twenty-five miles from Portsmouth and forty-five miles from London. Northampton is about sixty miles the other side of London. It is a city of one hundred and fifty thousand people, so quite a little place. All the big bands, Coldstream Guards and Scots Guards play there.

When we arrived there was a band at the station to meet us and the streets were lined with twenty thousand people or more. We were taken to the City Hall, where addresses of welcome were read to us, then we were assigned to the different hotels. We stayed at a hotel called the 'Pleasure,' some stayed at the 'Kam,' on 'Shiel Street.' So you see they have funny names over here.

We had free seats at the theatre Saturday night, we played in the park on Sunday afternoon and in the theatre Sunday night. They gave us more addresses and our officers who went with the band responded. We had to leave one piece out on account of a sepp, raid, but fortunately it was near London and one was brought down. We had a fine time there. We were the first bunch of Canadians who were ever there, especially a band. They were certainly fine people. They think the Canadians are all right too.

On the way home we saw Col. Borden on the train. He said the Brigade was on the way over and thought they were coming here. We are here for quite a while, I expect it is only a small place, two miles from the nearest town.

Well, so long, mother dear, for this week. Your loving son, HAROLD WILSON.

Attempted Burglary.

A daring case of shop-breaking was attempted here on Sunday last, when Mr. Frank Bishop, of the firm of F. K. On Wednesday the representatives of a jewelry house in Toronto identified the goods which had been peddling as those taken from a store at that place recently.
