The Annual Convention of the Nova Scotia Women's Christian Temperance Union was held at Truro September 25-27.

The officers were re-elected and Mrs. Chesley was made Hon. President. It was decided to recommend that each local Union adopt the \$1 fee and that 35c. of this be a subscription to the "Bulletin." Four Unions have this now and reported that it worked very satisfactorily.

It was the unanimous opinion that this was one of the best conventions we have had, and that much of its success and inspiration was due to our talented worker, Mrs. Livingston of Vancouver, B. C., our guest.

Mrs. Livingston spoke on Woman Suffrage at the second evening and War-Time Prohibition on "Y" night and was listened to with rapt attention. At the suggestion of Mrs. Livingston, our convention speaker, we decided to try a different plan next year in regard to our department work. Each superintendent will write her report as usual for the print, but also at convention will give advance plans and suggestions for the next year or a demonstration of her department.

The new resolutions brought in and passed were: That each member of our organization report violations of the Lord's Day Act to the officers and cooperate with them to secure better observance of our day of rest and discourage all work which tends to prevent a proper observance of the Lord's Day.

Also that the General Officers of the Dominion W. C. T. U. be requested to appoint a day to be known as Patriotic Membership Day, on which simultaneously throughout the Dominion efforts will be made to obtain new members.

An invitation was read for next convention to meet at Lunenburg, Lunenburg W. C. T. U. has the largest membership, 61, and made Mrs. Powers a life member of the Province last year.

Women's Franchise.

We—Canadians—are a democratic people, governed by the people, for the people (though until lately ourselves have had no voice in the government.) We are still allowed our personal opinion. If we turn back the pages of history three years we shall see that a great change has come over our ideas of what constitutes democracy.

We thought at that time we should eat what we liked, and as much of it as we chose. It was quite our own affair. We thought our friends should write us what they wished to say—without any interference. We boasted of the freedom of our press—brought by the life-blood of some of our ancestors. When the fatal war knell sounded in 1914 we gloried in our splendid volunteer army of 30,000 men, which in a few short months was found in the theatre of the conflict.

How changed is the scene! To-day we have a conscription law. We cannot eat indiscriminately! We may no longer write letters uncensored from our heroes in the battle zone!

We may not write along certain lines in our press—or our paper will be confiscated!

Why this change? Is this democracy? It is the boasted British Liberty? No—this is war—as Mr. Augustus said upon that tragic first of August in Downing Street—This is humanity's war!

All these restrictions are emergency war measures!

We a sacred thing the lesser form of liberty by the great freedom of true democracy in which we hope all the people of the earth will share. So our government has laid us the Federal franchise bill is an emergency measure to meet certain conditions.

While not upon all the Dominion women is placed the responsibility of the federal franchise an army of many thousands are thus brought into the governing class.

And it does seem now that this emergency legislation has become the law of our land, like conscription, press restriction, food conservation, censorship of mail; if we are loyal to the great cause of winning the war we should accept it; no matter what our personal views may be regarding its justice.

Mrs. Lloyd-George predicts that the newly-won right of suffrage for women will first of all influence the vote in favor of Temperance Reform. She says: "I think ultimately the abolition of the public houses and of the liquor traffic, just as they have done in some regions of the United States." The Temperance Leader and League Journal.

Cover the top with a layer of cracker crumbs, then with about a tablespoon of grated cheese, and again with another layer of cracker crumbs. Dust this over with salt and paprika and scatter a few bits of butter over the top. Bake in the oven until well browned.

Christmas Night

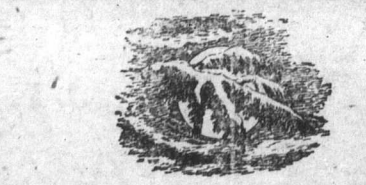

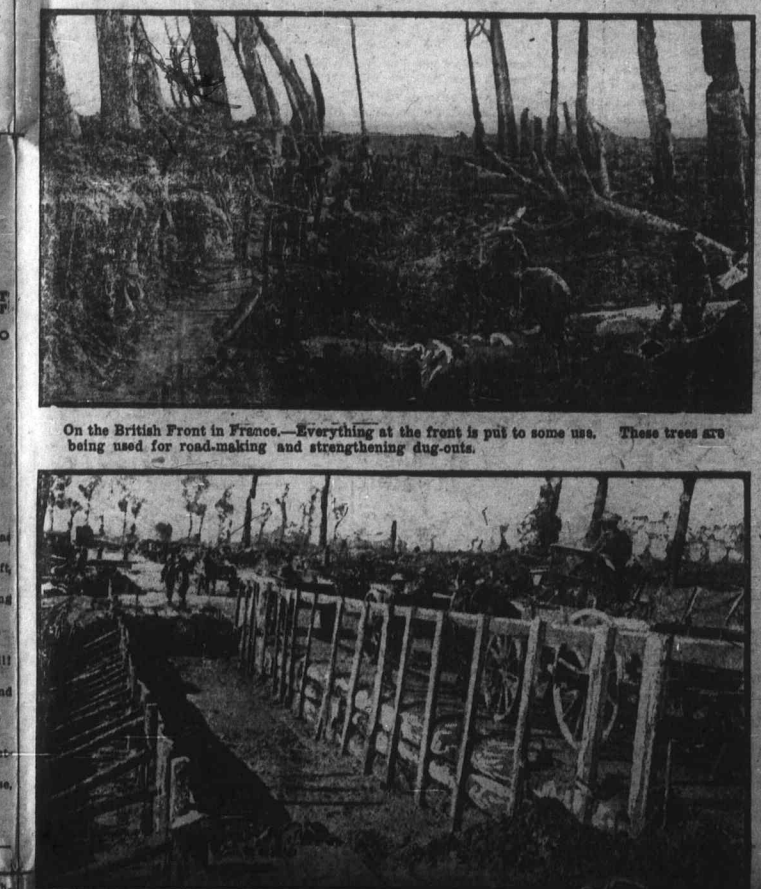

SAVE YOUNG SOWS

To increase the production of pig, young sows intended for the butcher must be saved this Fall. Next Spring's "Keep a Pig" propaganda, aimed at the residents of small towns and suburbs of cities, added to the normal avenue of sale, causes a record demand for the progeny of all these sows. Elsewhere will be found a business statement from Prof. J. M. Trueman, indicating the probable profit. Be sure to read it. Try to play things so that you will keep one or two more sows than in former years.
