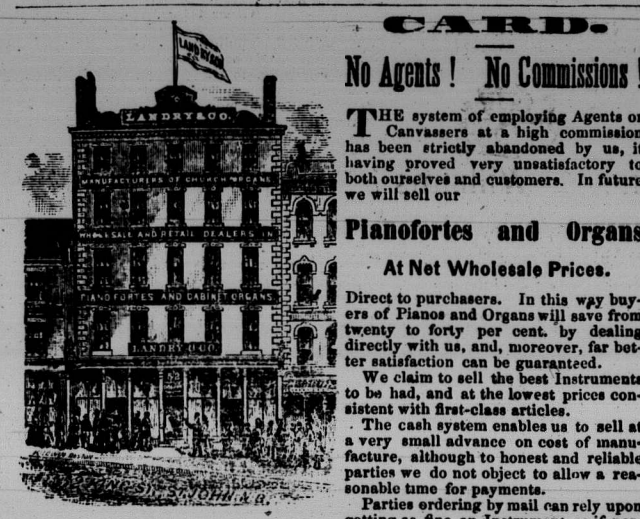


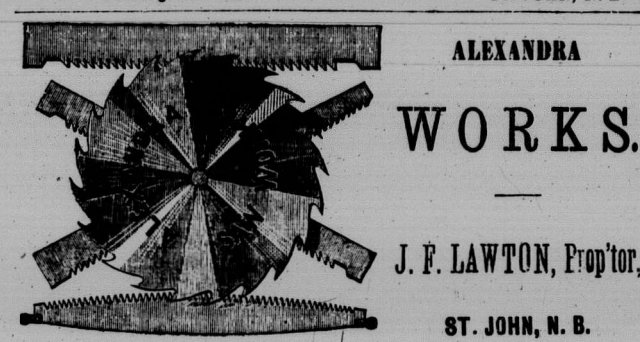

hundred persons passed along Tues-
day morning in the Excursion from
Halifax to Sackville. The excursion
reached Sackville at 7 p. m.

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.—In a
successful effort to save the life of a
nine year old brother Robert Irving,
aged 16, was drowned at Yarmouth
on Wednesday evening.

Rev. Dr. UNICEWILL (D.V.)
preach at St. Ann's Church, West-
cock, on Sunday morning next, at
11 o'clock, and at St. Paul's, Sac-
kville, in the evening at 7 o'clock.

Mr. W. T. PIERCE, a young law-
yer of Amherst, has been nominated
by the Grits of Cumberland in op-
position to Dr. Tupper. Mr. Smith,
previously announced having de-
clined to enter a political contest.

A PRIZE.—The schooner "L. B.
Hume," dead laden, was taken into
Sydney, C. B., last week by three
men belonging to the "C. S. S. Sack-
ville," of Dorchester, which vessel
had fallen in with her abandoned
lon. 48° 15' W., lat. 46° 30' N.

The Telegraph says Sir A. J.
Smith met with a very warm recep-
tion at Sackville. We should think

himself, expressed it by the word
"hot." But the temperature is not-
ing to what it will be on the 17th.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS OF Presi-

Local and other Matters.

The Dominion Elections take
place on Tuesday the 17th of Sept.
YELLOW FEVER is committing ter-
rible ravages in New Orleans, Mem-
phis, and other Southern cities.

The EXHIBITION BUILDING at Fre-
dericton.—Work on it was stopped,
owing to funds; \$3,000 more are
wanted.

An intoxicated Indian, named
John Smith, while carrying supplies
up the Nespisquit river in a canoe,
was upset in the "rip" near one of
the rapids and drowned. His com-
panion saved himself and also got
the canoe ashore.

A COMMITTEE MEETING of the Op-
position took place on Monday
evening at their Club-Room. A good
deal of enthusiasm was manifested,
and confident hopes of defeating the
Government in this county were
expressed. Addresses were de-
livered by R. Chapman and Jos. L.
Black, Esquires.

The *Ottawa Free Press* of 21st.,
assures its readers that in the
Parliament of 1879, John A. will
have a solitary supporter from New
Brunswick, and only four or five
from the Maritime Provinces!

Such lies as these are insulting to
the intelligence of the people, and
they are degrading to the press that
circulates them.

The Coroner's Inquest on the
body of the Mulatto boy, Kelly,
shot dead in the streets of Charlottetown,
has closed. The Inquest was
somewhat lengthy, and the evidence,
pointed strongly towards Johnson,
with Milner an accessory before the
fact, as committing the deed. They
have been committed and are in cus-
tody.

SUDDEN DEATH.—A very sad death
occurred at North Mountain, C. B.,
on Tuesday last. Miss Mary Mc-
Millan, daughter of the late Neil
McMillan, an estimable young woman,
on returning from a short walk,
was suddenly seized with vomiting
of blood from the lungs, and in the
short space of half an hour was dead,
all efforts to prevent the effusion be-
ing of no effect.—*News of the Week.*

A WOMAN kidnapped a little boy
from the Protestant Orphanage on
Campbell road yesterday, but was
soon afterwards by a policeman,
who suspected something wrong,
questioned her, and receiving no
satisfactory reply took her in charge.
The boy was taken back to the Or-
phanage, and as the authorities did
not wish to prosecute the woman she
was discharged.

ATTEMPTED MURDER BY GREEKS.
—The Liverpool *Advertiser* of the 15th
ult., gives an account of the at-
tempted murder of the officers of the
cruiser "Hermes" at Smyrna. The
Master, on the 1st ult., when off
Cape Passaroli by Greece. The
boatman, Nelson, and a seaman
named Enos had their skulls fractured.
The mate, also wounded was
expected to recover. The Greeks
escaped by jumping overboard. We
will give full particulars next week.

Two Boys DROWNED.—We are in-
formed a party of five young men
were crossing Brady's Lake, Caledonia,
on Sunday, the 11th, in a
canoe, and when about five rods from
where they intended to land, the
canoe sank. Two of the party,
Lindsay and Corcoran, aged 14
and 16 years respectively, were
drowned. Their bodies were re-
covered a few hours afterwards.
They were sons of Mr. John Con-
way, who was found drowned near
the Tool Bridge, in this river, some
years ago.—*Liverpool Advertiser.*

ALBERT POLITICS.
The candidates are: Jno. Wallace,
Esq., the late member; Geo. Rogers,
Esq., Ex-M. P. P.; and C. A.
Peck, Esq., Ex-M. P. P.; Geo.
Donville having declined the nom-
ination tendered him. The latter is
a Lib-Con. The interests are so out
of tune we cannot at present hazard any
opinion as to the result of the contest.

Shemogue Railway.
Sir A. J. Smith in his
cavasses, through this district the
other day talked a good deal in
favor of a line of railway from Cape
Tormentine to Point du Chene and
led a good many people to suppose
he favored that route in preference
to the one to Sackville. Some of the
people are quite pleased at the
prospect, but others think he is only
fooling them to get their votes.

SHEMOGUE.
DORCHESTER, N. B., 24th Aug.—
At 9.35 last evening, the Jury in the
Osborne case, after having been out
for 11 hours, returned to the Court
room and informed the Court that
it was impossible for them to agree
on a verdict. His Honor the Chief
Justice then asked if they were al-
lowed 30 hours to consider the
matter, he then be possible for
them to agree. They unanim-
ously declared it to be impossible.
His Honor then discharged them
from their arduous duty. Mr.
Holstead, counsel for the prisoners,
then applied to his Honor to have
John Osborne, one of the prisoners,
admitted to bail. Wm. Robertson,
of Moncton, and E. V. Tait, of Dor-
chester, together with Osborne,
gave bail for the amount of \$2000
each, whereupon Osborne was dis-
charged from custody on Tuesday
evening in November next, when
the case will be again taken up.

Annie Parker is to remain in the
custody of the Sheriff of Westmor-
land County until again required to
give evidence in this case. After a
sitting of five weeks and two days
on the very important and almost
unparalleled case, in which 118 wit-
nesses were examined—64 for the
crown and 54 for the defence—the
Court then adjourned till the second
Tuesday in November next.
Jury stood 10 to 2. It returned
10 for conviction and 2 for acquittal.
