He explained that although the Association had been organized only about seven months, it was necessary to hold the annual meeting in May to conform to general Association rules. Over twenty active members were present. The Secretary, W. J. Orr, read a report, which was presented to the Committee of Management and members of the Association by the Chairman, W. F. Coote, and the Secretary. The report referred to the progress of the work during the past seven months, and included the following statistics: Attendance at the building, average 40 daily; baths, average 6 daily; noon lunch, average 8 daily; Sunday afternoon Bible classes, average 8; men's meetings, average 63; prayer and praise meetings, average 9; boys' Bible classes, average 9; song service, average 38; shop meetings, cotton mill, average 36; shop meetings, Petrie Mfg. The juniors in basketball, Harriers' Club, etc., under the assistant secretary's direction, had developed some good players and runners. WANTS REDRESS.

Britain Wants Compensation From Cuba For Killing a Man.

Havana, May 29.—The British Minister to Cuba, A. C. Grant Duff, has presented to Governor Magoon a request for the direct payment of indemnity to the family of Wm. Harrington, a native of Nassau, Bahamas, and a member of the crew of the British fishing schooner Experiment, who was killed by a cannon shot fired by the Cuban revenue cutter Abeja off Cayo Coco, an island off the north coast of Cuba, last April.
