#### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

POTATOES are said to be selling at one dollar a bushel in Chicago.

THE six-year-old son of Mr. Stanley Wells, book-keeper of the Hillside Bridge Works had his leg broken near the thigh on Saturday by falling from a fence.

BOY STEWARD, 15 years old, was scotched to death last Thursday by the blowing out of a cylinder in the head of an engine at O'Leary's saw mill, Richibucto, N. B., in which he was employed.

THE plans for the new railway station at Georgetown, call for a freight and baggage room, 22 x 40, a private ticket office, 12 x 10, a general waiting room, 22 x 24, and a ladies waiting room, 14 x 16.

THE King's County lobster fisherman made very fair catches during the opening week of the season, taking from 500 to 1000 to a boat. The price is about 50 cents a case less than last year.

IT has been decided that the Provincial Exhibition will be held on the grounds of the Provincial Exhibition Association on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday the 23rd, 25th, 26th and 28th of September next.

AS we have already announced, the parishioners of St. Peter's intend holding a grand tea party in the vicinity of the Catholic church, Head St. Peter's Bay, on Tuesday July 1st, Dominion Day. Make no other arrangements for that date.

THE condition of the trades in St. John, N. B., is as follows: Trackmen, plenty of work; printers, fair; painters, good; every member working; moulders, very good; teamsters, good; shingle sawyers and hunchers, good; freight handlers, excellent; carpenters, good; ship laborers, fair.

COMMENCING Thursday May 1st, the Hillside will run on the Southpost from seven o'clock in the morning till nine at night. Her last trip will be from the Southpost side at twenty-five minutes after nine. On Sunday night her last trip will be from the Southpost side at twenty-five minutes to nine.

AN Ottawa despatch of the 25th says: The opinion among members of Parliament is that the work of the present session will be finished by the 17th of May. The supplementary estimates will be presented not later than Wednesday. Few railroad subsidies are to be voted; perhaps there will be none. There was no Home Rule resolution submitted.

LIEUT. Colonel Irving, of Halifax has been appointed commander of the 6th Regiment in the fourth contingent for South Africa. Lt. Col. Irving is a P. E. Islander and formerly had command of this district. He has always been a popular officer, and is a born soldier. He is an enthusiast in military matters and has always had an ardent desire for active service.

THE following men have been accepted for the fourth contingent in addition to those mentioned in our last issue: J. L. McLean, age 21, Dundas; No 3 93rd. H. L. Bowden, age 22, Kensington 4th C. A. C. E. McQuillan, age 20, Ch' Town. H. C. McIntyre, age 20, Ch' Town. The last named is the son of Lieut-Governor McIntyre. Enlisting ceased on Wednesday afternoon, 37 were enlisted altogether.

THE death took place very suddenly at Souris at 7.30 on Monday evening of Mr. Joseph McInnis, blacksmith. He had apparently been in his usual health that day and ate a hearty supper. Shortly after he complained of a pain in his chest. A doctor was sent for, but the messenger had hardly left before Mr. McInnis expired. He was 62 years of age and was employed at Souris for over 30 years. He leaves a widow, one son and three daughters to mourn.

A sad drowning accident occurred at Launging, King's County last Wednesday, the victim being Allan McPhee son of John McPhee of St. George's. The deceased it appears was dragged out of the boat by a buoy line, which was running out very rapidly and must have become entangled about the man in some way. His companion threw him a rope, but he failed to catch it and the unfortunate young fellow sank beneath the waves. He was 22 years of age and was employed at C. C. Morson's lobster factory.

THE steamer Campana of the Black Diamond Line arrived here on her first trip of the season on Saturday afternoon. Shortly after the work of discharging her cargo commenced the longshore union men belonging to Charlottetown declined to work unless the steamer's men, who were also unloading were ordered to stop. This the Captain refused to do and the local men struck in a body. Captain Demers states that he was willing to pay the 25 cts per hour demanded by the longshoremen, but as the steamer had cargo for 11 different ports, it was necessary to have some of his own men to assist in discharging so as not to get the freight mixed. After the strike all the available men on board were put to work and the steamer sailed about one o'clock Sunday afternoon. The union men say that in the case of other steamers, it is not customary for the crew to do stevedore work, and that if they worked together on this occasion it would be establishing a precedent for other steamers.

THE schooner Monitor, of smallpox fame is no more. She was burned to the water's edge in Georgetown harbor on Saturday night. The captain, John Fraser, of Harbor Au Bouche, states that he left that port on Saturday with a cargo of lime for Poole & Thompson, Montague Bridge. When about ten miles from Georgetown the cargo was found to be on fire. Despite every effort the fire gained the mastery, and the vessel had to be abandoned when opposite the Railway wharf. Shortly after she drifted into the wharf and at first it looked as if the railway's buildings were in danger, but fortunately the wind was southerly at the time. The captain strove to the vessel until forced to leave her to save his life. The vessel was not insured. The captain lost 100 bushels of wheat, 25 tubs of butter, besides clothing, his watch and all papers. The bulk was towed to Montague and the work of discharging her cargo of lime was begun. It was found to be in a fair state of preservation, and the loss will not be so great as at first expected.

#### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

WOUND was received in this city on Monday announcing the death of Capt. Taylor of the schooner Muscles, at Paramiribo, South America. He was a native of Caribonnan, N.B., but when not on board his vessel made his nominal home in Charlottetown.

MR. LOANE STEWARD, son of Lieut. Colonel Stewart has been appointed to a lieutenancy in the 4th Mounted Rifles for South Africa. He has already served in South Africa with the first contingent as a private and was one of those who marched with Roberts to Pretoria. He served as private, lance corporal, corporal and color sergeant. He will make a first-class officer.

THE decision was given yesterday afternoon in the injunction case of Mrs. McQuillan vs. The Charlottetown Light and Power Co., et al which has occupied the attention of the Master of the Rolls in the Court of Chancery for the past week. It was ordered: That the defendant, the P. E. I. Electric Light Co. pay the complainant \$50 for the damages up to October 1901. That the defendant the Charlottetown Light and Power Co. pay the complainant the sum of \$350 for damages done and sustained. That a perpetual injunction do issue enjoining and restraining the defendants from omitting smoke across premises of the complainant, so as to be an injury and subjecting the boiler to a greater pressure than 105 lbs. (The complainant has the liberty to enter and examine the safety valves) and restraining them from operating the machines so as to jar or shake the house thereby lessening the enjoyment or comfort of the inmates. This writ shall be suspended until Sept. 9th, 1902, upon the defendant making the complainant the sum of \$15 per week as long as they remain in the present situation. The costs of the suit to be paid by the defendant.

IN South Africa.

Speaking in London, Friday, Mr. Boderick, Secretary of War said: "We, perhaps, sight peace, but in the interval are sending out men and material to carry on the war for another year or two, if necessary—that being the only spirit wherein the Government can interpret the will of the nation to approach arrangements for the conclusion of peace."

THE war office has made public the following despatch from Lord Kitchener.

"PRETORIA, April 25—Since April 21st, 25 Boers have been killed, 28 taken prisoners 25 surrendered. There has been desultory fighting in various sections of the Transvaal and Orange River Colony. The garrison at Oekieh, Gape Co'ny successfully held out until it was relieved by the columns."
