### Bank of Montreal.

Manager Paddon must naturally feel proud of the excellent status to which he has brought the Bank of Montreal in this city. The annual financial report which appears in another column of this issue speaks for itself, and will convince our readers of the great advancement that has been made in the affairs of the Bank under Mr. Paddon. The report is well worth perusal. Not alone has the Bank progressed from a financial standpoint in a marked degree the past two years, but the building itself has undergone a complete renovation and alteration which makes it rank now amongst the foremost buildings in the city. The Architect, Green, and Contractor Davey took hold of the old quarters in the Gazette Building about two years ago to make a new Bank of Montreal out of it. They enlarged and improved the building in such a way that the original building which the public had been regarding as a splendid piece of architecture was thrown into the shade by the present magnificent and imposing building. The new Bank has a beautiful and substantial appearance outside, but the grandeur and beauty of it can only be revealed by going inside where the appointments are imposing, palatial and luxurious. Good taste and skill are in evidence everywhere and nothing has been omitted that can in any way facilitate the transaction of business. The revolving doors of glass and mahogany doors give entrance to the lofty chamber with marble wainscoting and panelled ceiling. Bronze and mahogany are everywhere in evidence in the interior fittings, giving the chamber a rich appearance. The floor is done in beautiful tiles, and the light is ample from all sides. Manager Paddon's office is elaborately finished and suggests stability, utility and comfort. The very best material that could be procured has been used. Apartments have been fitted up at the top of the building in harmony with the rest, where the staff have their permanent quarters. An elevator is used to take the patrons to the business offices. The providing such an excellent building is, no doubt, mainly due to the enterprise and ability of Mr. Paddon. He is loyally assisted by Mr. H. Carter, son of the late Chief Justice, who is a popular gentleman and well liked by all the business people of the city. The writer has had the privilege of a visit to the great Bank of Montreal in that

city, and having been conducted through all its apartments, and considering the wealth and size of that city compared with St. John's, we can say with pride that our local branch will not suffer any disadvantage by the comparison.

### Died on Numidian.

Frederick Wyse the Chief Cook of the Numidian died on the voyage out on the 6th inst., the day after she left Glasgow. He was only ill for part of a day and his demise was due to heart disease. Dr. Dougall did everything possible for him, but all was of no avail. He was a native of Glasgow, a widower, and was 57 years old and leaves one son who is in Glasgow to mourn him. The remains were consigned to the deep on the 7th. Capt. Snow read the burial service of the Presbyterian Church to which the man belonged. The crew were assembled on the quarter deck and assisted in the service.

### Numidian's Collision.

The ship which the Numidian collided with just off Liverpool on her inward voyage from Glasgow was the S. S. Timbo which was bound for Boston. The collision occurred at 1 1/2 a.m. on the morning of the 2nd inst., and the Timbo ran straight across the Allan Liners bows. The impact was terrible the Timbo was badly stove and was seen to be on fire a few minutes after the accident occurred. Her crew of 8 men clambered up over the Numidian's bow to safety. The ship wrapped in flames drifted down the Mersey and sank. The crew owed their safety to the marines of Chief Officer Henderson of the Numidian. The Numidian had one small plate stove forward.

### That Stabbing Affray.

The Spaniard Benigno Diaz, who stabbed Francis Borne on board the S. S. Benedick at Harvey & Co's wharf last night, was partly under the influence of liquor. Borne is a native of England and was a seaman on the ship. Borne is about 40 years of age and the other 31. Borne was sober at the time and when the Spaniard came on board he came into the quarters in the fore-cabin occupied by Borne and the other sailors. Borne told him he had no business there and to "get out" and got up from his seat and thrust the man out. The other then went to his own quarters secured a new sharp sheath knife and returning to the place from which he had been ejected rushed at Borne and plunged the knife into his body on the left side near the groin. The bowels were cut and protruded from the gaping wound inflicted. The sailors about then disarmed the Spaniard and the injured sailor was placed in a berth. He bled profusely and a sailor sought Constables Power and Frampton from Water Street and a few moments afterwards Dr. Anderson who was in Kennedy's Pharmacy was summoned and gave every attention to the wounded man ordering him to be taken to Hospital as quickly as possible. Sergt. Savage with Constable Devine and Stamp now proceeded to the ship and secured the Spaniard and after a search found the knife a murderous looking weapon. The prisoner was brought to the lockup where the knife now is. It is a short thick set man of forbidding aspect and was known to be of a vindictive and dangerous character amongst the crew. In a Court House to-day the statement taken from Borne at the Hospital last night by Inspector General Sullivan was read and interpreted to the prisoner by Mr. Evans of the city, after which a preliminary enquiry was held in the Judge's chambers. All the sailors present at the affray being examined. The injured man is not likely to recover. The last stabbing affray occurred here in 1873 when a sailor disembowelled a British brigantine in the stream.

### The Numidian Here.

The Allan liner Numidian Capt. Snow, arrived here from Liverpool at 9.20 this morning. The ship brought 200 tons cargo and 40 bags and 20 baskets of mail matter. Her passengers were, Chas. Johnson, Hy. Noseworthy, Helen Noseworthy, Carl W. Kahler. She left Liverpool on the 5th inst., and had fair weather up to the 11th Sunday last, when she had gales from the N. E. with rain squalls. Her runs daily were, 300 miles, 274, 252, 233, 213, 154, 110 and 300. Since being here before, 2 years ago, she has been running to Glasgow and Boston Mass. Capt. Snow, Purser Taylor and Chief McCalloch were on her then.

### POLICE COURT NEWS.

In the Police Court to-day John King, 45, fisherman, of New Bonaventure, and Jas. Keats, 35, labourer, of Goodview Street were charged with attempting to obtain \$120 under certain false pretences. Both pleaded not guilty, but the evidence of Peter Power, another tallyman on the premises, who discovered the fraud, Wm. Collins and R. B. Crocker, the wharfinger, swore that fish was tallied for one Henry Miller, who it was shown had no fish on King's schooner, the Abenege. This was done on Friday evening last, and 29 qts. were credited to this personage. Keats said he put it down in mistake believing that Miller had such fish on board as he had on the last trip here. King asserted that he knew nothing of the transaction. Both were however convicted and sentence was deferred till the Judge could get an opportunity to read the typewritten evidence.

A drunk was discharged. A man who was held for assaulting his wife was released on giving his own recognizance in \$100 to keep the peace in future.

SOLD FOR \$100.—We learn that Mr. Lighter yesterday disposed of his business on Water Street to Mr. S. B. Kenser for the sum of \$15,000. The transfer included the stock and goodwill of the premises, and after the goods have been sold Mr. Kenser will run a shoe store there.

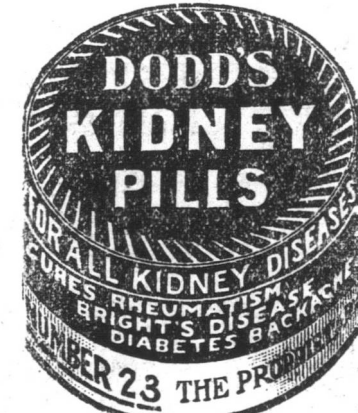
