Exploded Long Ago.

through the Morris Government agreeing to pay the debts in gold instead of bonds for railway construction. It makes no difference where the people look, the complexion of the Morris Government is the same. Prodigious sums are being paid for the support of the public and the people do pay it in finding it yearly more and more difficult to make two ends meet. Can people realize that twice as much money is being taken out of them in taxation as was taken some few years ago? The country is being tied white to serve the purpose of the People's Party, and all the time the public debt is increasing. Morris has added over Seven Millions to it since he came to power. The Public Expects The Auditor General To Do His Duty!

Yesterday we pointed out the need of increased vigilance on the part of the Auditor General during the interval between the closing of the last session of the Legislature and a General Election—particularly with a view to prevent such improper and unlawful means as those used under the present Morris-Norison Combine in 1911 to create a false surplus for political purposes. He should keep the accounts of each year to themselves as directed by law. There is now no Legislature and the present Tory Combine are on their trial before the people. A new Legislature and a new Government will have to pass upon all financial matters in the next session of the Legislature. The law is strict that no payments can be made which are not previously voted in the Legislature except some unforeseen and urgent necessity arises requiring an emergency expenditure when special power is given by the Governor. Such payments as increases in salaries of civil servants, pensions, etc., cannot under any circumstances be regarded as matters of urgent necessity and not only the Auditor General, but His Excellency the Governor should firmly resist every effort on the part of the Government to create such charges. During the session of the Legislature was the time to publicly vote money for these purposes. To do so now is an abuse of power which neither the Governor nor the Auditor General can properly condone. In any event payments of this kind, given corruptly for political purposes, are such that the incoming Government cannot confirm. The people of this Colony are burdened with charges sufficiently great already without having their burdens increased for corrupt purposes by the present spendthrift Combine in the secret conclaves. Any charges not having the sanction of the Legislature or not arising out of an emergency should not be paid and should await the sanction of the incoming Legislature. The Government rests with the Auditor General and the Governor to see that no such charges are created or payment made. The public expects these gentlemen to do their duty.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. PEKING, To-Day. The fall of Nanking will result in little change in the situation of the rebels, they having been cut off and doomed to defeat for several weeks. The Government contemplates going slowly in the work of suppressing the remaining rebels in the various provinces.

Special to The Evening Telegram. MONTREAL, To-Day. The thirty-sixth annual meeting of the American Bar Association opened on the platform was Judge Dittmer, of New York, who is believed to be the sole surviving elector of Presidents Lincoln and Johnson in New York City. Hon. Frank B. Kellogg was the first to arrive and came in for a round of applause which was accelerated when the Chief Justice of the United States followed, the entire audience rising to its feet. Premier Borden who came next received a similar ovation and by the time President Taft reached the stage, the audience had got themselves in good form. The climax was reached when the Lord High Chancellor, accompanied by ex-Ambassador Joseph Choate and Sir Kenneth MacKenzie arrived. People rose to their feet, and the applause continued so that it began to look as though the Americans were about to repeat one of the remarkable demonstrations for which their famous Presidential nomination conventions are noted. The subject of the Lord Chancellor's address was Higher Nationality. It was a magnificent effort. At the conclusion of the address and after a resolution had been moved, expressing appreciation of the Bar Association for the address of Haldane and the long journey he had undertaken solely for this purpose, the President of the association announced that the Executive and members had been pleased to elect the Chancellor an honorary life member of the Association. During the address Haldane read the following message from the King: "I have given my Lord Chancellor permission to cross the seas so that he may address the meeting at Montreal. I have asked him to convey from me to that great meeting of lawyers of the United States and of Canada my best wishes for its success. I entertain hopes that the deliberations of distinguished men of both countries who care to assemble at Montreal may add yet further to the esteem and good will which the people of the United States and Canada and the United Kingdom have for each other."

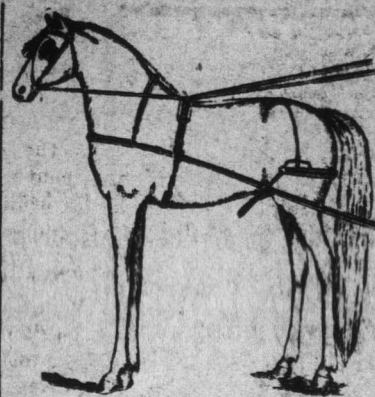

Attempt to Beat Transatlantic Record.

Liverpool, August 26.—With her cabins filled with many prominent persons, the Cunard liner Lusitania left on Saturday bound for a record trip to New York.

It is expected that the big steamer

will break all records for a quick passage. She is expected to maintain the tremendous speed of 28 knots, or 32.24 miles an hour, one knot faster than the record now held by the Mauretania. The Lusitania's turbines were recently rebuilt at a cost of more than \$1,000,000. The Mauretania recently made 27.04 knots for a day's run. Recently the Mauretania left Liverpool on a Saturday morning bound for New York. The French liner France, bound also for New York, left Havre that same night.

The Mauretania stood by at Queens-town for more than two hours to take on passengers and mail, and in that way lost much of her lead. Soon after she had cleared Queens-town she picked up the France by wireless, and when it was learned that the two steamers were very close a transatlantic race started.

On Wednesday morning the two vessels came within sight of each other, and many big bets were made by wireless as to the outcome of the contest. The Mauretania arrived off Sandy Hook just twelve minutes ahead of the France. The two steamers docked not thirty minutes apart.

The Mauretania's time was: From Dunst's Rock to New York, 5 days, 2 hours, 59 minutes. The France's time was: From Havre to New York, 5 days, 23 hours and 1 minute.

The agitation about the X-ray frock, as the Americans call it, is life everywhere except in France, which is rather amusing, because Paris is directly responsible, and Paris alone has somehow managed to escape the blame, writes one Paris fashion correspondent.

I gather from the echoes that reach us here that the present method of slitting skirts and of wearing transparent, décolleté bodices has met with much opposition abroad, and that America has even thought it worth while to legislate in consequence. But the French temperament has not a spark of the Puritan about it, and has therefore taken this so-called exhibition of indecency calmly enough.

Never having seen New York, I have no idea how Broadway likes to wear its skirts, but, judging from precedent, I imagine that American law had some excuse for stepping in, America with us is always more Parisian than Paris itself. It cannot not leave well alone, but must have Pelion piled on Assa, even in matters of chic.

Excess of Zeal

Now, the present ardour of attire will not admit of any more overhauling, if anything is to be left to the imagination. The best French people always know exactly how far to go and where to draw the line, but the others blunder through excess of zeal, and America often blunders with the worst of them.

No stepping in of the law will alter the situation. America should first reform the love of excess in the national temperament, and then the rest, including fashion, will take care of itself.
