The War Review by **Asquith and Kitchener**

With the opening of Parliament came the reviews of the war situation by Premier Asquith and by Lord Kitchener. Secretary of War in the House of Lords. The most sailent feature of the Premier's speech was that relating to the finances of the war. The Imperial Government was now spend ing three and half million pounds a day and he expected that it would reach a maximum of five million a Extensive war loans had been made to the Dominions and the Colonies and large expenditures had been made in directions, which public interest forced him from indicating. More money was needed immediately. A vote for 250 million pounds sterling would be taken and this should enable them to carry on until the third week in November. He said that since the beginning of the war nearly 3,000,000 men had enlisted in the army and navy, but that recruiting had fall en off somewhat. To those who have been hearing of a new army of 3,000, 000 men for the past six months, i will be somewhat surprising that the enlistment for the army alone has not yet reached the 3,000,000 mark. Lord Kitchener lauded the response which had been made to the call of the army, but he admitted that the question of reinforcements was the problem which was engaging the at the solution of the problem would call for serious sacrifices, which he felt would be cheerfully borne. From this it would appear that in Kitchener's opinion some step of a radical charac ter must soon be taken. In all prob ability this means that a resort mus soon be made to National service. Mr. Asquith stated that some 800,000 persons were now engaged in munition work, which was constantly being extended. The war had resolved itself into mechanism and endurance. He declared the unalterable determination of Britain to conquer and called for a cessation of bickering and the presentation of a united front to the enemy, which would not depreciate the effectiveness of Britain's dogged determined and unconquerable will to

win victory at any cost. Hiawatha Disaster.

There arrived by the s.s. Florizel Tuesday evening the remains of the late Capt. Clarke, who was burnt to death following an explosion of gasolene on board his schooner Hiawatha. The corpse was sent to the late home of deceased at Burin by yesterday's train, accompanied by Mate Hussey who had a miraculous escape from meeting the same fate as his captain. Mate Hussey said the terrible explos ion occurred on Saturday morning The captain was in his room dressing. Cook Farewell was preparing breakfast and the other four members of the crew were on deck. The explosion came as sudden as a flash of lightning. Seamen Kirby was thrown overboard with a broken leg and otherwise injured, though he managed to reach the shore; seamen Saunders and Hooper were done to death instantly when the deck was blown up. The cook, who was in the forecastle, escaped. struck a match to light a fire the escaping fumes of gasolene caught and then the explosion. 
