The new Government intends to summon a constituent assembly and restore law and order throughout the country. The programme of the new Government includes the liberation of Siberia from the Bolsheviki, the advance of possible foreign intervention, universal suffrage, establishment of provincial councils and labor bureau, distribution of land among the landless and control of economic activities. The flag adopted by the new Government consists of two stripes, white and green.


