CAPT. ROBERTSON'S REPORT TO PRIME MINISTER.

New York, N.Y., November 12, 1921.
Sir R. A. Squires, K.C., L.L.D., Prime Minister, St. John's, Newfoundland.
Sir,—As the senior representative of Newfoundland at the laying of wreaths in the Rotunda of the Capitol at Washington, on November 10th, 1921, by representatives of the British Empire on the occasion of the laying of wreaths in the Unknown American Soldier, I beg to submit to you my report:—
As advised by you, Mr. Field and I left New York on the night of the 10th so that we would be in Washington in ample time. Immediately upon our arrival we communicated with the British Embassy, who instructed us to proceed to the Racquet Club, where accommodations had been provided for

ing an epidemic of sickness, as a result of which he was stricken himself and never recovered. He was buried in one of the cemeteries at St. John's. The rest of the family then moved to England. At that time the Major's father was about six years old. He further stated that the people of St. John's were very kind to his grandmother and when she was leaving the country presented her with a very handsome purse.

As Friday was a legal holiday we stayed over at Washington until midday for the purpose of reviewing the parade for the burial of the Unknown Soldier, which action we hope meets with your approval, and arrived back in New York the same day.

In conclusion I would like to say that the British officials, and others with whom we came in contact, were most courteous, and did everything in their power to looked after our interests. On behalf of Mr. Herder, Mr. Field and myself, I would like to extend to you our appreciation of the high honour you bestowed upon us in selecting us as Newfoundland's representatives, and only hope that the part played by us was in keeping with the position for which we were chosen.

Stabbed With Penknife.

YOUNG WOMAN COMMITTS MURDER FOR FIVE DOLLAR BILL.

A 23-year-old girl named Grace Moreno alias Blanco has been sentenced to life imprisonment by Mr. Justice Monnet at Montreal for causing the death of a Newfoundlander named John James Rowe, who was a returned soldier. The woman was found guilty on Friday, Nov. 12th, and sentence was passed on Tuesday last. The tragic death of Rowe occurred shortly after midnight on May 19th of the present year. It appears that the deceased, who was dining at a restaurant near Vite and St. Urbaine Street, produced some money to pay his bill when the girl, Grace Moreno, snatched a five dollar bill from his hands. The girl ran to the street and Rowe followed her. In an altercation Moreno produced a knife and stabbed Rowe in the heart. The weapon was afterwards found and used in evidence. Dr. Derome, a medical expert, gave testimony that the blood found on the knife used to commit the crime was human blood. Judge Monnet, in addressing the jury before sentencing her, commented strongly on the address to the jury of the defending lawyer, Alban Germaine, K.C. He said your lawyer was devoted to such an extent that he made remarks during the hearing of the evidence to the jury. When Dr. Derome was answering questions concerning blood on the knife I clearly heard someone in the court room say "perhaps it is pig's blood. Your devoted lawyer said to the jury settle your mind that 'yes it was pig's blood—the blood of an Englishman.'" After sentence was passed the prisoner said "Thanks." The husband of Grace Moreno, Giuseppe Blanco was sentenced last April to two years in St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary for highway robbery. He was convicted of hitting a man over the head and stealing his money and watch.

Municipal Candidates Hold Meeting.

PROGRAMME OF POLICY OUTLINED.

The first public meeting in connection with the forthcoming Municipal Elections was held in the L.S.P.U. Hall last night. The meeting was called by Mr. E. J. Whitty, who is a candidate for Councillor. Mr. John Murphy presided, and in a few words called on Mr. Whitty to address the gathering. The speaker, on coming forward was greeted with applause. Before outlining his policy, he explained to the meeting that neither he nor the foremen, or men of the Unemployed Committee were responsible for the enormous cost of the Road de luxe, and that if the guilty parties were not brought to book it would be one of his duties, if elected to the Council Board, to see that it were done. The following planks in his platform were then announced:

1. Right of way for pedestrians over motor cars. In this he advocated, at least one of the lower roads for pedestrians leading out to Bowring Park.
2. Cobble stone drains. These he would have removed and if finances would not permit he would use tarrifa surface. The drains at present in use are poisonous, particularly underneath the stones, where the filth cannot be got at.
3. Labor brought from outside the city by contractors. This, Mr. Whitty said, should not be permitted unless those employed were made to contribute something to the city's revenue. He would have all such employers made responsible for the tax which would be a poll tax of \$5.00.
4. Housing and Landlords' Treatment of Tenants. The system of appraisement at present is unjust, and Mr. Whitty opposes the appraisement tax being passed on to the tenant without corresponding benefit. He said that there are many instances when the tax was raised 50 cents the tenant was charged \$2. The fine on landlords for having leaky houses did not meet the situation, and the speaker thought that some better remedy could be employed. Five years appraisement on old property he thought sufficient and quarterly collection of taxes.
5. Employees of Municipal Council. Better treatment should be given the permanent employees. These, if they do not turn up through no fault of their own, are docked even if they are only one half day off. In the payment of the men's wages there is also room for improvement. They should not be kept standing in the Council yard waiting till six o'clock for their wages, in view of the fact that their time ceases at 4 p.m. There is nothing modern about the system, said the speaker. It was a law passed at the request of a few people to prevent the men from going to the saloons. These have been done away with for some years, but the rule is still continued.
6. Public lavatories in addition to those in existence. These could be put in such places as fire halls and other public institutions.
7. Tax on vendors of produce from outlying settlements. The cost to the city for cleaning after the ponies and horses from the outside limits amounts to \$100 per week, yet these people do not contribute one cent of revenue. Those sending manufactured goods from outside the city should also be taxed. In this he instanced coopers' work.
8. The securing for the city of its per capita share of the general revenue; this would amount to \$70,000 per annum. Improved sidewalks for Gower Street, the weight of bread and other vital subjects were also dealt with by the speaker.

After concluding, Mr. Whitty invited any candidates who were present to come to the platform and address the meeting. Mr. E. D. Spurrell was the first to come forward. He thanked Mr. Whitty for his generous offer and the spirit of comradeship which prompted him to invite a competitor to speak at his meeting. He endorsed all that Mr. Whitty had said and added that he was an advocate of having the street car service extended to the higher levels. Amongst other improvements he would have the South Side Road East made passable for pedestrians. Under present financial conditions he could not father great projects, such as paving Gower Street, but he saw many improvements that could be made with little expenditure.

Availing of the offer of Mr. Whitty, Mr. Patrick E. Kelly came forward and announced to the meeting that he proposed seeking a seat on the Municipal Board. He stated that he had not a full platform prepared to place before the assembly, but he would appear in due course. He, however, indicated that the following items would be amongst the list: (1) a revision of the present charter, (2) suspension of the Poll Tax under present conditions, (3) new sidewalks on New Gower Street, (4) have a more equal distribution of the Council's money for repairs on the different streets, (5) improve the present tar coating on the streets, (6) make absentee landlords pay a higher tax, (7) erect a market place where all vendors from outside the city would be compelled to go. These he would have taxed. Mr. Kelly was formerly
