WINNIPEG WELCOMES THE PRINCE.
 Winnipeg, Oct. 10.—The prince of Wales is the honored guest of the city this evening. The prince of Wales who arrived here at 8 o'clock this evening from Calgary, the Canadian Pacific Railway, through the dinner hour crowd thronged Main Street and accorded him a very hearty welcome. The prince proceeded at once to the Garry Hotel, where he will occupy the Royal Suite, until his departure on Sunday morning for Chicago.

MACDONALD'S VANITY BLAMED FOR HIS DOWNFALL.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The opening of the campaign of the Liberal party is universally described as a brilliant election, perhaps the most brilliant incident in the extraordinary career of Premier MacDonald published in the intellectual laborer's review, the New Statesman, the organ of the Independent Labor Party. If the Liberal party faithfully represents the feelings of any large section of the party, it is not the outgrowth of some personal feud, it is considered as applying to a serious crisis within the ranks of the party. Paying a tribute to Mr. MacDonald's remarkable gifts as a Foreign Secretary, the article says that one of the highest officials in the Foreign Office consider he has been the best Foreign Secretary Great Britain has had, in a quarter of a century, and that if he is not mourned elsewhere he certainly will be mourned at the Foreign Office. The article proceeds to say that Mr. MacDonald alone is responsible for having brought the country to the present "absurd political predicament" that while he has been an immense success as Foreign Secretary, Premier he has been an utter failure. The writer then accuses Mr. MacDonald because "he missed no opportunity of insulting or deriding those who placed him in power." "This reference is to the statement that Mr. MacDonald consistently refused "to be out of Mr. Asquith's hand" concerning Mr. MacDonald's intense personal feeling against Mr. Asquith and his flouting of 4,000,000 Liberal votes. The article continues, "But Mr. MacDonald lacks generosity. He is jealous of those whose personal ambition he fears. As Prime Minister he seems too thin skinned to live." "With much more in the same vein the article complains of what it terms Mr. MacDonald's ridiculous amour propre vanity and aloofness from his colleagues and says "if he could sink his vanity, and prejudices and admit the possibility of there being other men besides himself he might be in power another year or two." The article then proceeds to lament Mr. MacDonald's failure to co-operate with the Liberals. On this point however, the New Statesman is not concerned in political circles to represent the general view of the Laborites.

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MARKET LETTER.

(From our Boston Correspondent.)
 Developments, both financial and commercial, continue to favor the constructive side of the market. Outside of the oil industry, which still suffers from an over supply of that commodity, and the copper industry, which on the surface seems to be suffering from a similar cause but in reality is facing a more favorable prospect than at any time since the war, reports emanating from the business world are of a nature to instill confidence rather than apprehension. Where changes are occurring either in the rate of activity or in prices they are, almost without exception, upward.
 There is a notable disposition that will assist rather than obstruct the efficient conduct of business. This later phenomenon should be given due consideration in any discussion of the business trend. Some observers believe it will result in pronounced business activity after the election, assuming of course that the election result is favorable. As far as financial matters are concerned, it is enough to say that we are passing through a season of the year when credit strain is normally the greatest without the slightest flurry in the money market.
 With two very important events scheduled for the near future—a National Election and the financing of the German Loan—the successful result of which cannot be accepted as a foregone conclusion, it is not to be wondered at that the stock market has at times shown hesitation and little disposition to stage a rapid advance. We continue of the opinion that the buying of stocks is of much better character than the selling and believe the line of least resistance to be upward.

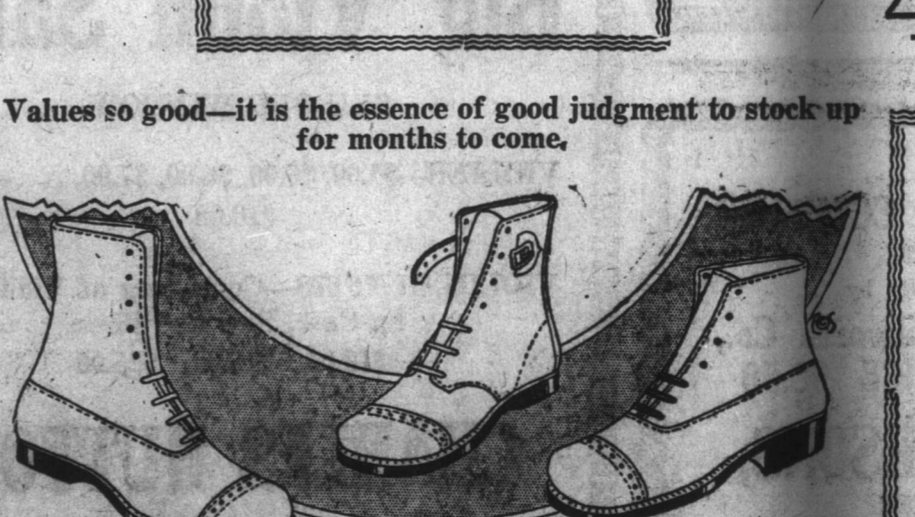
