PARIS, Nov. 13. His Majesty Cyril I, Emperor of Paris, to convoke a Crown Council at which all the Grand Dukes who have recognized him will be present Grand Duke Dmitri has been appointed his Majesty's representative in Paris with two counsellors, one for military affairs and the other for civil affairs. Grand Duke Cyril proclaimed himself Emperor of all Russia in September last in a manifesto made public at Cobourg, Germany. His claim was disputed later by the former Dowager Empress Maria Poedorovns in a letter to Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholsievitch, whom she addressed as the oldest member of the House of Romanoff. Cyril's action, she declared, was premature since she still hoped that the Russian Royal Family was not dead. She added that our future Emperor will be designated by our fundamental laws in union with the orthodox church and the

In Interests of Science MEDICAL MEN TEST EFFECTS OF

COCAINE ON THEMSELVES. Medical men confessed to the members of the Medical Society in London that they had tried the effect of cocaine on themselves in the interests of science. Professor Dixon declared that after injecting 11/2 grains he had no feeling of pleasure such as was commonly spoken of, but only headache

and intense insomnia. Dr. Copeland, who works in co-operation with the professor, mentioned that he had sniffed synthetic cocaine. At first he was afraid he was going to have a fit of convulsions, but afterwards, he added, There was a period of exhileration in which I was very talkative." It was suggested by Dr. H. H. Dale that the cold atmosphere of a scientific laboratory was hardly the place to reproduce the experiences of the cocaine-taker out to enjoy a hetic life. Sir William Wilcox, the Home Office expert, who presided, declared that he


