Low Cost a Surprise "I really have been surprised myself at the low cost; nothing like it ever appeared on rails before. It consumed 56 watt hours a mile of electron nergy, which translated into money value, means that while making four-teen cross-town trips a day loaded with passengers it cost 4.3 mills a run-ling mile—less than 30 cents for the hole day's operation.
