CONSTABLES HAD VOTES.

Court of Appeal Hands Out a Judgment
Sustaining the Constables of the
Marry Government.

Toronto, Sept. 26.—The Court of Appeal handed out judgment late Saturday afternoon on the three questions submitted by the Attorney-General regarding the question of the constables' vote. The questions were as to whether a constable employed by a deputy returning officer for the purpose of an election and paid a reasonable fee therefor should be entitled to vote, whether persons employed at reasonable work during an election by deputy returning officers should be entitled to vote, and whether a person supplying anything for the purposes of an election, such as renting a room as a polling booth and was paid reasonably therefor, should be entitled to vote. These were the three questions which the court answered in the negative. Thus all such persons are, according to the judgment, fully entitled to vote, and the contention of the Premier of the Ontario Government is sustained.

LAY BLAME ON THE FLY.

Cause of the Spread of Typhoid in
American Camps.

Washington, Sept. 24.—At last the blame has been placed where it belongs. It was the common, busy housefly that caused the typhoid fever in the camps, and is directly responsible for the deaths of hundreds of brave soldiers.

This is the scientific conclusion of a commission of scientific men appointed to investigate the condition of the camps, the cause of typhoid fever in them, and authorized to recommend measures to prevent its spread and for its prevention in the future. The commission is composed of Major Lee, Dr. Vernon C. Vaughan and Dr. Shakespeare of Philadelphia, all prominent surgeons and members of the Army Medical Corps.

The commission is a unit in the declaration, and brings forward apparently indisputable facts to support its conclusion. The report is considered of the greatest importance, not only to the War Department and the army, but to science itself.

The commission found that flies, as was naturally the case, were present in the camp by the millions. The surgeons looked into the matter further and found that the flies fed off the fecal matter from the hospitals, and then at mealtimes shared the hardtack and bacon of the soldiers. In the first instance the fly picked up on his six hairy little feet infinitesimal particles containing the germs of typhoid fever, and as he merely promenaded over the hardtack and bacon he deposited them there. One fly could do little harm, but millions of them conveyed a sufficient quantity of germs to inoculate large numbers of the soldiers. The inoculation was slow but sure.

A CRIME OF THE KLONDIKE.

An Exhausted Man Brutally Shot to
Death.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 22.—George Bowman of Bridgeport, Conn., was murdered in Alaska last winter during a terrible snow storm by a companion named Johnson of Springfield, Mass. He was almost in sight of the golden Mecca when his strength failed him and he sank down in the soft snow. Johnson, who was the leader of the party, went back to him and with an oath blew out the unfortunate man's brains with a revolver. This is the terrible story that is told for the first time by J. C. Sachs, who has just returned from Alaska. His partner, Edward T. Calhoun of Yonkers, N. Y., witnessed the deed, which was committed a short distance from Dawson. Calhoun, too, nearly lost his life from a bullet from Johnson's revolver. Nothing was ever heard of Johnson. It is presumed he perished in the snow storm.

ESCAPED THE GALLOWS

To Be Immured for Life in the Peni-
tentiary.

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—It is announced that the Council yesterday adopted a recommendation of the Minister of Justice that the clemency of the Crown be extended to Jean Baptiste Guillemain, the St. Hyacinthe murderer, and that the sentence of death be commuted to imprisonment for life.

The reasons alleged are that the evidence was purely circumstantial and not particularly strong, it being difficult to see when the crime could have been committed even though the convict was in possession of the murdered man's money. The youth of the convict and the influences surrounding him were also taken into consideration. The Minister of Justice awaits his Excellency's approval.

WILL WEAR THE RED RIBBON.

New Knights of the Legion of Honor—
Lieut.-Governor Jetté a Commendator.

Quebec, Sept. 24.—The President of the French Republic has conferred the following honors on the occasion of the inauguration of the Champlain monument:

Commander of the Legion of Honor—His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Jetté.
Officer of the Legion—Hon. F. G. Marchand, Prime Minister of the Province of Quebec.

Knights—Hon. Judge Chauveau, president of Champlain Monument Committee; Mr. Lachapelle, mayor of Laval University; Hon. Judge Piquet, president of the Maisonneuve Monument Committee, and Dr. Lachapelle of Montreal.

Two Petitions Disposed Of.

Toronto, Sept. 24.—The end of the petition and cross-petition between Wellington was reached at Osgoode Hall yesterday morning before two judges of the election court, Messrs. Osler and Macdonald. Col. A. H. Macdonald, Q.C., of Guelph, was present on behalf of the petitioner, Mr. William Slater, against Major John Nutrie, the Liberal member, and announced that no evidence would be offered. Mr. Hugh Guthrie of Guelph, for the petitioner, Molloy, against Henry Horlop, the Conservative candidate, made a similar announcement in regard to his petition, whereupon both were dismissed.

He Had Five Wives.

Toronto, Sept. 23.—Henry O'Brien, the bigamist, was given five years in the Kingston Penitentiary when he pleaded guilty in the Police Court yesterday. The prisoner admitted having three wives, two of whom were in court, but was not asked to give evidence. Inspector Archibald placed the number at six.

Nicholas Bott, one of the prominent citizens of Walkerville, a brother to John Bott, ex-Mayor of the town, was tried for embezzling \$832 from Hiram Walker & Sons. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 18 months in the Central Prison.

Thomas Howard of St. Mary's has laid a charge against Mary Hyde, who lives near Blanchard, of obtaining from his too willing hands the sum of \$315 while under promise to marry him. Miss Hyde claims that the money was given her by her admirer.

Mrs. Sarah Edwards, a Toronto matron, and Miss Nancy Torrey, her sister, of the same city, will reside for the next month at Castle Ogilvie, and be fastened on jail diet. Police Magistrate Jelfs at Hamilton gave them each 30 days for abandoning a baby belonging to Miss Nancy on Tuesday night last.

The prosecution against Adam Wilson for a breach of the Charlton Act has been withdrawn. Wilson was arrested on a charge of being concerned in the murder of an Indian girl's child, it being alleged that the little one was smothered in a blanket. There is difficulty in establishing the girl's age, hence the Crown's action.
