STRATHCONA'S HOT FIGHT.

March to Badfontein a Series of Encounters With the Enemy.

Seven Were Killed and Wounded—Boers Were Thick as Flies Among the Rocks and a Number of Canadians Were Captured—Lord Roberts Reports Eight Fights in Different Places—His Appeal on Behalf of Home-Coming Soldiers.

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—A report has been received at the Militia Department from Col. Steele, commanding Strathcona Horse. It is written from Spitz Kop, under date of Sept. 16, and in it he gives the following reference to the action at Badfontein, in which 7 non-commissioned officers and men were killed and wounded.

"On the 5th inst., the regiment performed the duty of protecting the right and left of the camp. C Squadron, under Capt. Cameron, were on the right. Lieut. Leckie was sent to form an observation post on the top of a high ridge, and Sergt. Logan, with a section to place ammunition on the same ridge more to the front. The latter, while proceeding, became entangled with the enemy, with the result that only one of the section escaped. Lieut. Leckie reached the summit, but after a time, owing to the strength of the enemy, was obliged to send for support. This I sent him, but on the way, they also met the enemy under cover of the rocks. Sergt. Brothers and Pte. Crutchshank were killed.

"The force marched on the 7th, and every day until arriving here on the 11th we have met the enemy. Corp. Nicholson and Pte. Flint were wounded at Devil's Knuckles, while the regiment was making a rapid advance on the Boer convoy. They are not seriously wounded."

Kitchener Left in Command. London, Nov. 5.—Lord Roberts, according to despatches from Cape Town, has taken his sick daughter to Johannesburg, and Lord Kitchener is left in command. It seems likely that he will have plenty of work.

Gen. Dewet is reported to have made his appearance near Frankfort in the northeastern corner of Orange River Colony, and small bodies of Boers continue harassing tactics.

It is asserted that Lord Kitchener intends to stop the pursuit of commandos and to try to settle the colonies by garrisoning and organizing the towns for rapid raids with mounted troops.

AGAINST DRUNKEN ORGIES. Striking Appeal From Lord Roberts About the Troops Home-Coming. London, Nov. 5.—Lord Roberts sends from Pretoria a striking appeal to his countrymen to refrain from turning the welcome on the home-coming of the troops into a drunken orgy.

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Little Girl Shot Little Boy. Pinkerton, Ont., Nov. 5.—A very sad accident occurred Saturday morning about two miles from here. A little boy named Walter Bobbs, aged about 10 years, went on an errand to a neighbor's. The family were absent excepting a little girl of about the same age. A rifle that had been borrowed was returned a few minutes previous, and the girl playfully picked it up and pointed it at him, when it was discharged, killing him instantly. An inquest will be held.

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BOYS WELCOMED AT PICTON.

The Town Put on a Holiday and Patriotic Garb in Quick Time.

Picton, Nov. 6.—When it became known that Messrs. Wall, Bradshaw, Holland and Croft, members of D Company, first Canad a contingent, would arrive home Monday evening, everybody set to work to prepare a reception fitting for the occasion. By evening the town was attired in a patriotic garb that eclipsed anything ever before witnessed. The boys arrived by the steamer Hero at 7.30, and it was not until then that it became known that Messrs. Croft and Wall would not arrive until next day. As the steamer entered the harbor she presented one of the grandest sights that eyes ever gazed upon. She appeared to be one mass of fire, while from the banks on either side bonfires and fireworks reignited the tooting of whistles, ringing of bells and the firing of cannon were deafening. A large carriage drawn by a four-horse team was in waiting, as well as Nos. 1 and 4 companies of the 16th Regiment and the Mayor and members of the Town Council. A procession was formed, headed by the Citizens' Band, and escorted the boys through the principal streets of the town, ending up at the market square.

Here a very flattering address of welcome was read to the boys by ex-Mayor W. Boulter, which was accompanied by the presentation of a sovereign to each of the boys. Addresses were also delivered by Mayor Williamson, Col. McDonnell of the 16th Regiment and others. Mr. Holland made a brief reply in which he heartily thanked the citizens for such a spontaneous reception. The decorations were the finest ever in Picton.

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
