Congregational Church Organ.

The announcement that the new organ would be opened with special musical services drew large audiences to the Congregational Church yesterday. His text in the morning was St. Matthew, x., 30, "Think not that I am come to send peace on earth; I am come to send peace, but a sword." The Rev. Doctor's eloquence deeply interested his hearers. The concert which was to have been held to-night has also been postponed on account of the organ being unfinished.
