In the Dining-Room.

TUESDAY, MAY 4.

BREAKFAST—Sliced oranges with sugar. Oatmeal blanc-mange. Ham toast. Radishes. Johnnycake. Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Salt mackerel with cream sauce. Broiled potatoes. Cream waffles. Tea.

DINNER—Tomato soup. Beef-steak and kidney pudding. Potato snow. Parsnip fritters. Lettuce. White puffs, lemon sauce. Cafe au lait.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrapbook.

Ham Toast—Mince finely a quarter-pound of cooked ham with an anchovy, boned and washed; add a dish of cayenne and pounded mace; beat up an egg, mix with the mince and add a quarter-cupful of milk. Put on fire in sauce-pan for three minutes, and serve on toasted bread.

Broiled Potatoes—Cut four cold-boiled potatoes in slices, lengthwise, quarter of an inch thick; dip each slice in two tablespoonsful of wheat flour on a saucer and lay them on a greased gridiron over a fire of coals, when both sides are browned nicely take them on a hot dish, sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper and pour an ounce of melted butter over them and serve hot.

Beefsteak and Kidney Pudding—Divide two pounds of rump steak in inch-square pieces, and two kidneys, each into eight pieces. Make a crust of six ounces of finely-chopped beef suet and one-quarter teaspoonful salt rubbed well into a pound of flour; work the whole to a smooth paste with one-half pint of milk; roll it out and line a deep dish, leaving an inch of crust to overlap the edge and enough left for the top crust. Then cover the bottom with a portion of the steak and a few pieces of kidney; season with a light sprinkling of pepper, salt, and flour; add another layer of steak, kidney and seasoning. Proceed in this manner till the meat is all used, when pour in sufficient water to come within two inches of the top of the basin. Moisten the edge of the crust, cover with the top crust, and seal the edges together; the gravy may not escape and turn up the overhanging paste. Write out a cloth in hot water, dip it into boiling water and let it boil four hours. If the water diminishes always replenish with some hot from a kettle; the pudding should be kept covered with it all the time and not allowed to stop boiling. When the cloth is removed cut a round piece in the top of the crust to prevent the pudding bursting, and send it to the table in the basin, either in an ornamental dish or with a napkin pinned round it. Serve quickly.

Potato Snow—Choose six large white potatoes, as free from spots as possible, boil them in their skins in water to which a tablespoonful of salt has been added until perfectly tender; drain and dry them thoroughly by the side of the fire and peel them. Put a hot dish before the fire; rub the potatoes through a coarse sieve on to this dish; do not touch them afterward, or the flakes will fall, and serve as hot as possible.

Cafe au Lait—Take a pint each of hot made coffee and boiling milk; strain through this muslin into coffee-pot, to get rid of the grounds, and serve hot.

THE POTATO PATCH SCHEME

Is Now Ready for Adoption—Plots Secured for the Poor to Work On.

The Organized Charity Society now have their finger potato scheme ready, and it will be launched at once. Mr. Edward Daly has kindly given them, free of charge, the use of six acres of desirable land, between the Barracks and the C. P. R. roundhouse. The society has also as good as secured a second plot in the city limits. These plots will be plowed and prepared for seeding immediately. They will be laid out in sections, and the serving poor allowed to cultivate potatoes or any vegetables they please during the summer months, so as to lay in a store of food for the winter.

The society are confident that the scheme will be successful, and save much outlay of relief money when the cold weather comes again.

AN INCENDIARY FIRE

On Horton Street—Dan O'Hearn's House Damaged.

Fire, supposed to have been of incendiary origin, broke out Saturday night in a vacant house on the south side of Horton street, a few doors west of Richmond street. The building belonged to Mr. D. O'Hearn, and was damaged to the extent of about \$250. The alarm was given at the central station at 11:40 by a man who walked into the hall, and coolly inquired of the firemen on watch, "Do you know anything about the fire?" When the brigade got to the scene, the west side of the building, a story and a half above the ground, was streaming with smoke, and the rain assisted the work of putting out the flames.

THE NEW CAVALRY CORPS

The School of Instruction Will Open Here May 14—An Instructor From Toronto.

The course of cavalry drill for officers and men of the First Hussars will be commenced on May 14 instead of May 3, as previously arranged. The regulations authorize the attendance of eight officers, eight non-commissioned officers, and eight horses. An instructor will be sent from the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Toronto, but the immediate supervision will fall to Captain Pearce, who is already at this station as acting captain of No. 1 Company in Captain Barre's absence.

The drills will be held in the fields in the neighborhood of the barracks. The men will probably be allotted quarters in the barracks. Ample accommodation for the horses has already been provided in the stables built last fall, to the east of the barracks. A number of the infantry men at the barracks would like to have a try at the cavalry drill.

COURT SCENE IN ST. THOMAS.

Defendant P. R. Wilbur Faints Under Close Examination.

St. Thomas, May 3.—At the assizes on Friday morning a sensation was provided in the fainting of a witness at a critical point in the examination. P. R. Wilbur is defendant in a suit regarding a will, and certain interlinings were said to have been made by him in one document which were not made in the other. Mr. Robertson examined for some time, and then Justice Robinson took a brief, urging an explanation as to why the interlinings had been made. The question was repeated two or three times, but instead of an answer, the witness refused to one side and fainted. A number rushed to his aid, and carried him from the room. Dr. McLarty was summoned and Wilbur came to again. He was once struck, and has a tendency to drop out under intense excitement.

A Serious Charge Against Timothy Sullivan.

Riders on the Sidewalk Before the Court—A Victorious Dog Case.

Timothy Sullivan, a young man with a criminal record about two feet long, dates back to 1884 and contains a memo of 31 trials for various offenses, such as drunk, disorderly, assault, larceny, etc. Sullivan was sentenced to six months in the Central Prison last September, and came back to town on Friday night, only to assault Alfred White, of Rectory street, and chew his face badly.

White's story was that while on his way home from a grocery store, he met Sullivan, who knocked him down and chewed up his face horribly. As he stood in the box he showed the left side of his face to the court, which looked much the same as though he had been clutched by a tiger or wild cat.

Sullivan asked leniency. He admitted being drunk, but not very drunk. He elected trial by jury on the charge of assault, but on the charge of "drunk," Magistrate Parke imposed a fine of \$10 or 20 days.

Sullivan has a reputation as a biter. Last summer he bit Policeman Weir, was committed for trial, and let go on suspended sentence. Soon after this he went to the Central for six months for drunkenness, and a petition was
