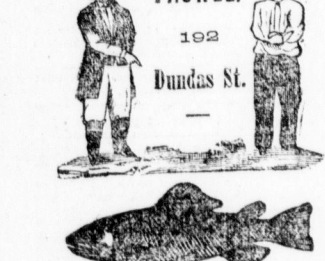

THE WEATHER.

Toronto, Ont., July 27-11 p.m.—

The pressure is comparatively high over

the Southern and Northwestern States, and

about normal or a little below elsewhere.

The weather has been cool in the North-

west Territories, Manitoba and the North-

west States, and continues very warm in

other portions of the continent. Thunder

storms have occurred in many portions of

the lake region.

Minimum and maximum temperatures:

Calgary, 34°-70°; Prince Albert, 40°-62°;

Qu'Appelle, 46°-66°; Winnipeg, 54°-70°;

Port Arthur, 56°-66°; Toronto, 68°-80°;

Montreal, 70°-88°; Quebec, 62°-82°; Hal-

ifax, 60°-86°.

Toronto, July 28-1 a.m.—The indica-
