METEOROLOGICAL

Toronto, Oct. 4, 8 p.m.—Pressure continues higher than average throughout the Dominion, and the only low area of any importance shown by tonight's chart is one near Florida, which although at present nearly stationary, will ultimately move either north or northeast. A few light showers have occurred today near Lake Ontario, but the weather generally has been fine and in the Northwest Territories quite warm. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 50-70; 48-76; Prince Albert, 52-72; Qu'Appelle, 28-72; Winnipeg, 24-64; Port Arthur, 22-54; Parry Sound, 40-60; Toronto, 31-56; Ottawa, 38-52; Montreal, 38-56; Quebec, 32-48; Halifax, 42-48. Local temperature—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Wednesday, Oct. 4, were 60 and 35.5 degrees. Today sun rises at 6:30; sets at 5:52; moon rises at 7:17 a.m.; sets at 5:57 p.m.

—It is said that partridge will be remarkably plentiful this fall, as the dry weather has been favorable to the hatching and rearing of young birds.

—The annual thanksgiving service of Christ Church, Delaware, will be held on Friday evening, Oct. 13. Rev. Canon Dunn, of St. Paul's Cathedral, will officiate, assisted by the rector, Rev. T. H. Brown.

—Lieut.-Col. Buchanan, of Wolseley Barracks, is gazetted to command the Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry, vice Otter, transferred to the active list of officers non-regimentally employed. In the Sixth (London) Field Battery, Provisional Second Lieutenant G. S. Johnston retires.

—Many of the passengers of the Scotman called yesterday at the police headquarters, Montreal, to identify articles stolen by the crew, and recovered by the police. Miss Edythe Hyman, of this city, was among the fortunate ones, recognizing several rings and other valuable jewelry belonging to her.

Young leave tomorrow morning for Winnipeg to attend the annual meeting of the Canadian Passenger Agents Association. Mr. De la Hooke will no doubt be re-elected secretary, a position which he has held for the past ten years.

THE INTERNATIONAL CONGREGATIONAL COUNCIL.

Mr. Edmund L. Yeigh, of Toronto, chairman-elect of the union of Ontario and Quebec, who has just returned from the council held at Boston, Mass., was present at last evening's prayer meeting at the First Congregational Church, and gave a brief resume of the proceedings at that notable gathering. Reference was made to the special fitness of holding such a reunion in a city where Congregationalism on this continent had its birth. The fact that representatives of Great Britain, the United States, Canada, Mexico, Australia, Japan and China met in Holy Communion at the new Old South Church, Boston, was mentioned as a notable event. And Mr. Yeigh could not speak in adequate terms of the hospitality of the people of Boston and vicinity, who anticipated every want with lavish hand and thoughtful kindness. Some of the notable speakers at Tremont Temple, where the convention gathered, and the subjects discussed, were of absorbing interest to those who were present to listen to Mr. Yeigh's glowing eulogy.

INDUCTION AT BURNS' CHURCH.

On Tuesday afternoon, Rev. Isaac McDonald, lately of Glamis, was inducted at Burns' Church, Moose, into the pastorate of that congregation. A meeting of the London Presbytery was held there for that purpose, among the ministers present being Rev. Messrs. John Milloy, moderator, who presided; H. W. Reede, of Alma Street, St. Thomas, who delivered the induction sermon; D. C. Johnston, the stated clerk of the presbytery; R. Stewart, of Melbourne; J. H. Barnett, of Kintyre; A. Wilson, of Newbury; Alex. Henderson, of Melbourne; J. W. Bell, Napier, and Archibald Stuart, of this city, who was for many years the pastor of the congregation. The induction prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Milloy, the charge to the minister was delivered by Rev. Mr. Henderson, and the congregation was addressed by Rev. Mr. Stewart. The ladies of the congregation entertained those present to refreshments at the conclusion of the services.
