WEEKLY REVIEW. In point of attendance and the amount duce offered, the markets held here during the week have been up to the average. Trade was brisk, and with the exception of dressed hogs, potatoes and eggs, prices are unchanged from those

eggs, prices are unchanged from those quoted the previous week.

Grain—Oats formed the bulk of the offerings in this line; sales mostly at 90c to 92c per cwt, or 30c to 31½c per bu.

Very little wheat offered; prices range from \$1 to \$1.05 per cwt for sprouted, and \$1.15 for good wheat. Barley is selling at 90c per cwt ing at 90c per cwt.

Hay and Straw-About 70 loads of hay offered during the week; this is below

the average, consequently prices are firm, at \$8.50 to \$9.50 per ton. Straw sells at \$5 to \$5.50 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—The market is well supplied with inferior butter at present; there is only a limited demand for this class, at 12c to 14c per lb: choice crock butter is in good demand and prices are firmer, at 16c for crocks and 17c to 18c for pound rolls. Eggs are in good demand, and have advanced from 1c to 2c per dozen over last week's prices; sales are made at 16c to 16½c per dozen for crates and 17c for basket lots. Vegetables—Potatoes are easier, selling from 5c to 10c per bag lower, at 70c to 80c. Tomatoes are unchanged in price, and are now quoted at 40c per 20-lb bas-

ket.

Fruits—While apples are more plentiful, prices are about the same as the previous week, at 40c to 50c per bu, or \$125 per barrel. Pears sell at 60c to 70c per bu. Plums, 35c to 50c per 12-quart basket; they are nearly done. Grapes are very scarce, at 25c to 30c per 10-1b basket. Peaches sell at 40c to 65c per 12 quarts, the latter price for Crawfords. 

William Levack, who is the heaviest dealer in the market, said that prices were steady on the whole; he bought 500 cattle, giving from \$5 25 to \$5 65 for exporters; from \$3 60 to \$455 for butchers; crom \$4 65 to \$5 for picked lots, and from \$5 to \$5 40 for picked lots of butchers' cattle for export. Dunn Bros. bought 15 stock bulls, averaging in weight 1,050 lbs, at prices ranging from 3¼c to 3½c per lb. S. Levack bought 6 cows at \$3.50 and 2 steers for export at 5¾c.
