FEMALE SHERLOCK HOLMES

And How She Located Erring Hus-
band in Canada.

Toronto, Sept. 16.—A case of remark-
able detective instincts in a woman
has just occurred here. About four
months ago, John Dickson Smith, of
Bathurst, near London, England, a man
of 45, ran away with his wife's niece,
Arlene Martin, a girl of 26. He had
been a bookkeeper in a large dry-
goods store, Mrs. Smith learned that
they had come to Canada. She landed
in Montreal on August 28. While there
she inserted an advertisement in a
Montreal paper and, "retentions va-
cant," named a bookkeeper for a
large drygoods store, a man of about
45, with experience preferred. Fail-
ing to locate the missing husband, she
came to Toronto, and repeated the ad-
vertisement in an evening paper here
on Saturday last. Yesterday she re-
ceived an application for the position
in her husband's handwriting. The
applicant was immediately located, and the
police assisted in a reconciliation, by
which Mr. and Mrs. Smith will re-
main in Canada, and the girl return

**SAYS NO DISCOURTESY WAS MEANT TO-
WARDS SIR THOMAS LIPTON.**

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Sept. 16.—Presi-
dent Roosevelt approved of the is-
suing of a formal statement of the facts
concerning the Savannah-Cornthian
Yacht Club dinner incident.

Colgate Hoyt, chairman of the board
of trustees of the yacht club, visited
Oyster Bay and had a conference with
the President. Mr. Roosevelt expressed
regret that any published statement of
the dinner incident should have placed
him in a false attitude, and, with a
view to relieving Sir Thomas Lipton of
embarrassment because of the state-
ment that he had treated him with
discourtesy, he authorized Mr. Hoyt to
make a plain statement of the episode.

Mr. Hoyt this morning issued a for-
mal statement, in which he says Presi-
dent Roosevelt had accepted the invita-
tion to the dinner solely on condition
that it was not to be a formal func-
tion. Neither the name of Sir Thomas
Lipton nor of any other person was
mentioned in this connection, Mr. Hoyt
said.

A letter from Secretary Loch is given
in Mr. Hoyt's statement. In this the
secretary says that President Roose-
velt has directed him to tell the yacht
