PREMIER ROSS ADDRESSES GREAT MEETING OF LIBERALS!

Splendid Crowd of Col. Leys' Supporters Throng the New Grand Opera House.

Gathering Enthusiastic for Ross and Progressive Government.

WARM GREETING TO LONDON'S MEMBER.

Able Addresses by the Premier, Col. Leys, Mr. Hyman and Others.

The meeting that was held in the New Grand Opera House last night fulfilled the desires, the expectations, of the most ardent Liberals of the city. It was a magnificent personal tribute to Premier Ross, to his government and to his supporter in this city, Col. Leys. It betokened the interest which the people of London take in the public questions which are now uppermost in the minds of all citizens. It was not simply a Liberal meeting. It was a representative gathering, Liberals predominating, of course. Many Conservatives were there, and repre-

sentatives of the two other bodies of citizens who have nominees in the field, the Prohibitionists and the Socialists. It was a very large, a very enthusiastic, a very responsive audience, one which was attentive, thoughtful, and, at times, when the arguments satisfied, exuberantly demonstrative in expression of approval. The great crowd of citizens, entirely filling the splendid new gathering place on Richmond street, was drawn together primarily to hear the magnetic leader of the Ontario Government, the Midland boy of yesterday, who is now the man of Ontario, the premier of his province, probably the most brilliant orator of his country. It is sufficient to say that he was all that was expected of him. He was in excellent form. The wear and tear of the campaign was not in evidence. It had not reduced his energy, nor cooled his ardor, nor darkened the sparkle of his wit. At nearly the close of this fascinating campaign he was fresh, vigorous, alert. His voice only showed the effect of the strain that it has been subjected to, but as he spoke its tones

became stronger and clearer. His remarks upon the referendum were the distinctive portions of an admirable effort that occupied an hour and a half. At this period of his speech in particular he had the absolutely undivided attention of the large audience which included very many ladies, and as his reasonable arguments were presented simply and frankly, he was interrupted by frequent applause. The immense audience was visibly impressed. His hearers were even more enthusiastic in their approval of his remarks regarding Col. Leys' candidature, and the premier's eloquent appeal for support in his patriotic and progressive work for the development and prosperity of Ontario was in all ways one of the most effective ever heard in this city. In making this plea he was assisted by Col. Leys himself, whose reception was remarkable for its enthusiasm; by London's ever-welcome member in the Dominion House, Mr. Hyman; by South Essex's able member at Ottawa, Mr. Mahlon Cowan, M.P., and very materially assisted by the president of the London Reform Association, Mr. George C. Gibbons, K.C., who is always an ideal chairman. With him and the premier and Col. Leys in the front row on the platform were Mr. Charles S. Hyman, M.P., London; Mr.

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LIEUT.-COL. LEYS WILL CARRY LIBERAL COLORS TO VICTORY

His Name Was Presented at the Nomination Meeting in the City Hall Today.

Mr. Adam Beck Was the Choice of the Conservative Party.

PROHIBITIONISTS AND SOCIALISTS

Are Represented by Messrs. F. W. Daly and Fred Hazelgrove.

Registrar R. H. Dignan received nominations for the provincial elections at the city hall today. The time for receiving the nominations lasted from 11 o'clock to 2 o'clock, and it was optional whether in that time speech-making would be allowed.

At 11 o'clock, as is usual upon such occasions, the number of people in the city hall was quite small, but was being continuously augmented, and about noon the hall was well filled.

Registrar Dignan read the official documents which warrant the receiving of nominations, and announced at 11:30 that he was prepared to receive the names of candidates.

It was in his power to allow no speaking until 2 o'clock, but he left that for the party men to decide among themselves. He said that if they desired to speak sooner than that, they might.

The nominations were quite slow in coming in. Registrar Dignan had frequently urged the audience to hurry in putting in the names of their candidates.

Nominations.

The nominations were presented about 12 o'clock. They were as follows:

Col. Francis B. Leys, by Mr. Frank E. Leonard, seconded by Mr. Philip Fox.

Adam Beck, by Major Beattie, seconded by Mr. John Forrestal.

Frederick William Daly, by Mr. G. N. Weekes, seconded by Mr. J. W. Westervelt.

Frederick Hazelgrove, by George L. Bryce, seconded by Philip Courtney.

In moving Col. Leys' name, Mr. Leonard said that he did so with very great pleasure, and Mr. Pocock added that Col. Leys had represented the city ably in the past and would continue to do so in the future. (Cheers.)

In moving the name of Adam Beck, Major Beattie said that he believed that the mayor would receive the large majority ever given a candidate in this city. Mr. Forrestal said that he had pleasure in seconding this nomination.

Mr. Weekes presented the name of Mr. Daly, "a gentleman well-known to you," he said, "and is becoming bet-

ter known every day." He stood for cleanliness and propriety in elections as well as prohibition of the liquor traffic.

THE SPEECHMAKING.

It was arranged by the speakers that the speechmaking should begin as soon as the last nomination was received. They agreed that Col. Leys should speak first for 20 minutes; the mayor also for 20 minutes. Mr. Daly and Mr. Hazelgrove, as long as they desired. Mr. Daly thought that this privilege might be abused; he might speak too long, and therefore he moved that the last two speakers have only half an hour, which was agreed to.

"You may speak for half an hour, if you like," the chairman said, "and then the other gentleman may have all afternoon, if he wants it."

The audience elected Ald. Cooper chairman, upon motion of Mr. Charles S. Hyman, M.P., and Major Beattie, ex-M.P. He bespoke a fair hearing for all the speakers, whereupon he introduced Col. Leys, who was received with great enthusiasm.

Lieut.-Col. Leys, M. P. P.

Col. Leys, on rising to speak, said: Mr. Chairman and Fellow-Electors: Four years ago you did me the honor of returning me as your representative for the Local Legislature. At the time I made certain promises to you, which I have since then carried out. I promised you the Normal School, which brings a yearly revenue of from \$80,000 to \$100,000 to this city. You would not have had this today had you elected my opponent. There has been built an hospital in connection with the London Asylum, worth \$100,000, which you would not have had, either, had you elected the Conservative candidate for it. It was at first proposed to make the addition to the hospital accommodation of the asylum at Toronto.

THE SAWLOG POLICY.

The speaker dwelt upon the sawlog policy of the Ross Administration. He spoke of the sawmills that had been moved from Michigan to cut up logs on our own territory, thereby giving employment to our men. There were mills in operation at
